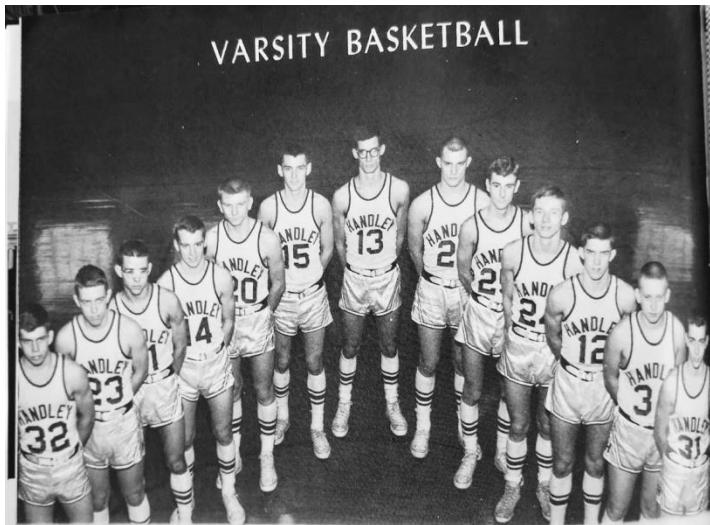

## FORWARD

I could probably write volumes about Handley basketball games. In my first volume of the history of Handley football, I tried to write a few lines about each game played. Because basketball has so many more games, I limited this work to the scores and teams that Handley has played, starting in 1923. At the end of this work I wrote a brief history of each season.

A few scores I could not find, either in the Handlians or the Winchester Star. But I could always find something somewhere that stated if they had won or lost. If some scores are wrong, I apologize. Sometimes the Handlian and the Star or in some cases the Northern Virginia Daily had conflicting scores.

My dad picked out a game to take me to in my first look at Handley basketball—the 1962 state final game with Pulaski at VPI, now Virginia Tech. I remember the long ride and the longer, it seemed, ride home after Handley lost 48-41. I remember the games in the “crackerbox” and how the Handley players seemed to know every inch of that floor. Once, some friends and I got locked out while waiting in line to see a game. No problem. We somehow managed to climb up on the roof, and make our way to the windows in the crackerbox. It was always hot in there, so finding an open window was no problem. We settled in with our fellow students and cheered the Judges on. Today, the students use the “crackerbox” as a library. I suppose most of them go in there every day not even thinking about how many battles the Handley team had played on that floor.

Then the new gym opened and I thought it was as big as the one I had seen at VPI. Of course it wasn't but to a teenager it seemed that way. It was built on a hill, so I guess some old timers can still call the Judges the Hilltoppers. I guess the kids today never heard of that name either. Or when the JV team was called the Attorneys. The history is always there, every time the players suit up.

So in a small way I have tried to preserve a little bit of history with this small work. Also included is a list of every team that has ever played Handley. Some of these schools no longer exist, a lot came after Handley and a very few came before Handley.

As I stated in the football work the same goes for this basketball work---Here's to Handley High!

\*In 1968 and in 1970, Handley lost in the regional finals to Harrisonburg (1968) and to Robert Lee (1970). The next game they both played was the state final game, Harrisonburg losing to Blacksburg 63-62, and Lee losing to John Langston 50-47. Hence the regional final game for Handley those two years were considered the state semi final games as well, according to the VHSL record book.

### **END NOTES—THE FIRST YEAR—1923**

Although Handley started playing basketball in 1923, Winchester High School had been playing the sport for years before. The Winchester High School was located on Cameron Street, known to most of us locals as John Kerr Elementary School. Today the school is owned by Shenandoah University.

1923 was a rough year for the new Handley High. They had no gym, as the school was still under construction. They had no place to practice either. As might be expected, they only won four games out of twelve.

But they were not alone back in those early days—few high schools had gyms back then. For instance, when Handley went to play Boyce High, the games were played in the parish hall at Boyce. And when they went to Hagerstown High, the games were played at the Hagerstown YMCA.

So where in 1923 did Handley play their home games and where did they practice? Shenandoah Valley Academy, SVA, had been playing basketball for a number of years. They graciously let the young Judges use their gym for home games. And a citizen by the name of Ashby Sprint let the Judges use his packing shed for practice sessions.

Also that first year Handley entered the Cumberland Valley Athletic League. Also during that first year, representatives of the major high schools of the Valley met in Harrisonburg with a state representative to form District 3 of the VHSL. District 3 was divided into two divisions and the winners of each division would play for the championship. Section A consisted of Winchester, Front Royal, Luray, Shenandoah, Harrisonburg and Bridgewater. Section B consisted of Staunton, Waynesboro, Charlottesville, Covington, Clifton Forge, Lexington and Buena Vista. There was a question on whether or not to admit VSDB (Virginia School for the Deaf and Blind). So that first year was a learning experience for the young team. They also played for several years behind the football program, which unlike the basketball program, started out as winners right from the beginning.

## **END NOTES—1924—THE SECOND YEAR**

In 1924, Handley's gym was finally complete—although it was only completed one week before their first game. This meant that the team only had one week to practice. That new gym, which later became to be known as the “cracker box” is now a library and computer room at the school. Handley played in its cracker box gym between the years of 1924-1966. In their very first game in their brand new gym, Handley lost to Bridgewater 26-21.

Also in 1924, Handley played for the first time their rival, Shenandoah Valley Academy twice. Both times the Handley squad lost, 20-15 and 23-20. Also, as in the first year 1923, Handley played in the Cumberland Valley Athletic League (CVAL) and also played in District 3 of the Virginia League.

1924 also saw the first time that Handley played in an overtime game. They played Hagerstown at the Hagerstown YMCA and won in overtime 24-23.

At the end of the year the Winchester Star reported that the Judges had beaten every one of their opponents at least once, with the exception of Chambersburg Pa, who beat the Judges twice by scores of 24-14 and 25-17. On their schedule for 1924, they also played the Winchester All Stars (Handley won 21-14, an American Legion team from Winchester (Handley won 45-19) and a team made up from local high schools from Shenandoah County, Walnut Springs (Handley won 26-15).

Also in 1924, Handley played one game with its faculty and the boys won that game 37-23.

## **END NOTES—1925**

In 1925 Handley played a lot of games—28—although one of them did not count as a varsity game. They played a couple of athletic clubs—Waynesboro and Middletown (Md.) athletic clubs. They beat both of those clubs. They also played and lost to the Mt. Jackson Athletic club, but this game was not considered a varsity game because Mt. Jackson had several graduates on their team.

They also had a first and second team—the second team was sort of a JV team that played several games.

The highlight of the year probably was the win over Fishburne Military Academy (Waynesboro Va.) by one point, 24-23. Fishburne was the 1924 state prep school champions.

Handley also played in another overtime game this year, losing to Randolph Macon Academy 32-29.

They also played Berryville and Harpers Ferry high schools for the first time.

## **END NOTES---1926**

The 1926 season had a couple of interesting tidbits. In a Win over Berryville High school, a game in which Handley won 30-4, Berryville was held to no field goals for the entire game. Their 4 points came on foul shots.

Also, in a loss to Waynesboro Pa, (38-24) Handley missed 68 shots—Waynesboro missed 31.

### **END NOTES 1927-1928**

Handley did not field a team these two years for what was termed “a lack of interest”. Several times during the 1926 season the Star stated that games were “lightly attended” and encouraged people to attend the games.

### **END NOTES 1929**

After being absent for two years, the Judges returned to league play with only “raw” recruits to pick from. As a result, the season, although not a complete failure, was a disappointing 4-10. They started the season winning three out of the first four games. Both Berkley Springs and Frederick (Md.) entered the CVAL this year. In a Handley win over Berkley Springs at Handley, Berkley Springs stated they had a hard time playing in the huge gym—the “cracker box!” Still the Star stated there was still not too much support for the basketball program—even after a two year absence.

### **END NOTES 1930**

In 1930, Handley played 18 games and won half of them. They managed to split games with most teams on their schedule. They split games with Boyce, Berkley Springs, RMA, and Shepherdstown. They lost twice to Martinsburg, Waynesboro Pa., and Hagerstown. They won twice from Charlestown and Middletown.

### **END NOTES 1931**

Although the Judges finished 5-7, several games stood out. Handley defeated Martinsburg at their gym in overtime in one win, and defeated RMA at home for another win. RMA had earlier defeated SVA in an upset. Also, Handley defeated RMA on their court this year. The Judges won 3 out of 8 CVAL games this year, tying Martinsburg for third place.

### **END NOTES 1932**

1932 was an unusual year for the Judges. They only played 8 games. Six of those games were in the CVAL, and the Judges lost all six. Their lone win was by 5 points over RMA, a non-district opponent. They played RMA twice, losing once by one point. The Winchester Star stated, “The Judges have played every team in the circuit and have taken a beating from the entire bunch.” It also stated that local fans said that other schools lay

greater stress on basketball than the Judges. In one game against Hagerstown, the Judges failed to score a single point in the fourth quarter. Also in a preliminary game against Hagerstown, a “midget” game was played between Martinsburg and Handley, which Handley also lost. This year Martinsburg won the CVAL, the first time they had ever won the title in basketball. The Handley team this year was young, with many players coming to the sport for the first time.

### **END NOTES 1933**

1933 also was an unusual year for the Judges. It was the only year in the entire history of Handley basketball that the team did not win a single game. They went 0-14 for the season. However some interesting things still went on. Prior to their first game with Martinsburg, both cadet bands from the schools put on a concert before the game. Also, another “midget” game between the two schools was played. The home game against Waynesboro was played at 3:15 PM. RMA defeated the Judges twice this year. Also, a semi-pro team, the Dixie Collegians played against an all star team from Martinsburg in the Handley gym. The Handley ‘cracker box” was busy this year-hosting the basketball championships between FFA teams around the region. The Handley gym also played host to the Boy Scouts basketball championships.

### **END NOTES 1934**

Handley played 12 games this year—the last time they would play a CVAL schedule for 3 years. Their record might have been or could be 4-8 as the Handlian of that year has the Judges beating Berryville 24-22 while the Star has them losing that game 26-24. Before this game the Berryville girl’s team defeated the Berryville girl’s alumni. In order to get more students to the games, the game with RMA was played at 3:15 at Handley. Because of lack of student interest, Handley would withdraw from the CVAL for three years. In the win over Hagerstown the game was tied at 5-5 and Handley won 20-9. In some contests, the juniors played before the varsity game. Again this year, before the Martinsburg games, the “midgets” of both schools played.

### **END NOTES 1935, 1936, 1937**

Handley withdrew from the CVAL for these three years and played strictly intramural games. There were two reasons for this. One, as noted above, was student turnout. Even scheduling afternoon games right after school did not get the majority of the students to the games. Also, Dr. Quarles wanted to get more students interested in playing basketball, and thought this might be a good way to do it. After 1937, the students expressed to Dr. Quarles that they wanted to compete in the CVAL again, and in 1938 they went back to the league.

### **END NOTES 1938**

Basketball at Handley this year was on “probation.” This was the first year the sport was played since the end of the 1934 season. Lack of student support and local support were

the main reasons. Dr Quarles also wanted more students playing the sport, so he thought playing just intramurals would get the kids playing. The boys requested that a team enter the CVAL this year and it was approved by the board—on the conditions that the students and locals would support the team. Expectations were not high, as many of the boys had never played the sport before. The game against Charles Town was played at 3:15, a test to see how many students turned out. A good crowd showed up to see Handley win 28-25. Good crowds were also seen when the Judges went on the road. The Boyce team was interesting this year. Boyce played basketball all year round. In the fall the games were outside and went inside when the weather was bad. Handley won both games from Boyce. On the downside, Handley lost to Harpers Ferry twice. The Judges also beat Hagerstown twice and lost to Martinsburg twice, finishing the year 5-7.

### **END NOTES 1939**

The Judges had a bad year in 1939. They only won one game, against Charles Town, while losing 15. Once again, the attendance was not good. The student attendance was not bad, but the local people still stayed away. The Junior Evening Star stated that the students wanted to see more local people at the basketball games as in the football games. In the game against Waynesboro Pa. a Handley player scored 14 points, almost the total of the team, in the 48-16 loss. Two of their biggest losses came at the hands of RMA. They also lost twice big time to Fort Hill Maryland, who went on that year to win the CVAL. Fort Hill had won the Cumberland City title and the Western Maryland division Championship and were the favorites to win the Maryland State Basketball title. A few games were close, but still it was a dismal season.

### **END NOTES 1940**

The Judges had another bad year in 1940, winning only two games—both over Robert E. Lee of Staunton, once by two points and the last game by one point. They lost 15 in 1940. In one game against Martinsburg, Handley trailed 23-3 at half, and at the end of the game the Judges high point scorer had just 3 points. In a loss to Warren County, the Wildcat coach started his second team against the Judges. At half the Judges led 9-5. In one game against Charles Town, the Judges did not score a single point in the first quarter and trailed at half 25-3. Later in the season, the Judges started a few ninth graders. In one game against Fort Hill, the Judges again went scoreless in the first quarter.

### **END NOTES 1940-1941**

The Judges had another bad year in 1941. The year, however, started on a good note as the Judges defeated Berryville High School, then called the Bobcats, by a score of 24-23. It went downhill from there, as the Judges could only win 3 games, and went winless in the CVAL. In a games against Hagerstown, which the Judges lost by 2 points, foul shots cost them the game. Against Charles Town, they only scored 4 points in the first half, none in the first quarter. Against undefeated and two time CVAL champs Martinsburg, Handley got swamped 31-8. Harrisonburg got revenge from a Judges football whipping



(36-0) by beating the Judges in one game. In a game against Shepherdstown, the Judges could only score 4 points in the entire first half. In a loss to Warren County, the Judges went into 2 overtimes only to lose by two points—neither team scored a point in the first overtime. In the return game against Harrisonburg, in which the Judges won their third game, the referees let the game get out of hand in the second half. It all added up to a dismal 3-17 record.

### **END NOTES 1941-1942**

The Judges had a better year in 1942, winning 7 games while losing 10. They had not won a CVAL game in three years coming into 1942. In a loss to Berkley Springs, 23-22, a Handley player missed a last second layup that would have won the game. In one game with Harrisonburg, they managed to score just 5 points in the first quarter. The win against Hagerstown was their first win in 3 years over a CVAL team. Handley lost a heart breaker to an undefeated Shepherdstown team by just two points. Midway through the season the Judges lost three starters due to grades. In the second game against undefeated Shepherdstown, the Judges lost again by just two points. Against Warren County, the Judges won in overtime when a Handley player was fouled and he made one of two free throws to give the Judges the win 25-24. Handley scored just 2 points in the first quarter in a loss to Harrisonburg. Handley scored just 9 points in the first half in a loss to Warren County. Handley still managed to finish 2<sup>nd</sup> in the CVAL.

### **END NOTES 1942-1943**

Handley had an interesting year in 1943. They played their alumni for the first time and won. In a game played in Romney, the Judges could only take 6 players. After leading at half by 24-9, they lost two players to fouls and lost the game 39-33. It was also a snowy trip to and from Romney. In a win against Berkeley Springs, the Indians could only score on field goal for the entire game—Handley won 31-8. A highlight of the season was a win over Hedgesville, who was undefeated at the time. It was reported at home games that the Judges' fans were booing and hissing at opposing players when they shot foul shots. Coach Hunter Maddex instituted a rule that the opposing player would continue to shoot foul shots until the booing and hissing stopped. Handley ended their year at 8-7.

### **END NOTES 1943-1944**

Handley played 15 games in 1944, and only won 5 of them. In a game against Shepherdstown, in the Handley gym, the game was called two minutes before regulation because of a surprise air raid siren. It wouldn't have mattered much, as the Judges lost 31-12. In a loss to RMA, Handley could only score two points in the second half. In a loss to Martinsburg, Handley managed to score but three points in the entire first half. In the second game against Romney, the game ended with a Judges' win 38-36, but that win was contested by the Romney score keeper. The next day Romney told officials that the game should have been tied 38-38 at the end of regulation. But after tabulating the scores it was determined that the score stood 38-36 for a Handley win. The Judges lost at least two games in 1944 at the foul line.

### **END NOTES 1944-1945**

Handley had a bad year in 1945—winning only one game and losing 13. In the game against Romney at the cracker box, the game was played at 3:30 PM so a large number of students could attend. Handley suffered a 60-23 drubbing. In a game against Shepherdstown, the Cardinals sank enough free throws alone to win the game (18) as they handed the Judges a 36-14 loss. In a loss to Charles Town, Handley managed just two field goals for the entire first half. The half time score was 23-4. In a game against Martinsburg, Handley did not score a single point in the fourth quarter.

### **END NOTES 1945-1946**

Handley had a better year in 1946- 8 wins and 7 losses. Four of the seven losses were by three points or less. The Judges played one game with RMA at 3:30 in the cracker box, right after school let out. In that game, the score was tied 26-26 when an RMA player was fouled just before the final whistle and made the foul shot to give RMA the win 27-26. In another game in the cracker box, the Judges lost to Charles Town 28-26, and following that game a Winchester semi-pro team defeated the Athletic Club of Capon Bridge. In a loss to Shepherdstown, the Judges lost by three points on foul shots. In one game against Martinsburg, the Judges only scored five points in the entire first half.

### **END NOTES 1946-1947**

The Judges had a strange year in 1947. They won three of their first four games, but then lost 13 in a row to not qualify for the District 5 playoffs. They did not play Clifton Forge or Covington, even though they were in the same district, because of the travel time. They lost two games in a row by only one point and five games by 8 points or less. Injuries and sickness played a role in the season also. In a game in Hagerstown, the Judges only scored two points in the first quarter and none in the second quarter. They lost a game against Warren County by one point in the final second. In a road game against Harrisonburg, the game was played to benefit the March of Dimes. When all was said and done, the Judges finished the year with a dismal 4-18 record.

### **END NOTES 1947-1948**

Handley's record in 1948 was 9-9 in reality, because they lost a game with their Alumni this year. The official record is 9-8. They defeated Strasburg in their opener 40-7, and Strasburg was held scoreless in the last quarter. They also held Wardensville scoreless in the last quarter in their second game, a 33-18 win. They defeated Charles Town in the last minute of play. In a home game against Martinsburg, they game was followed by a rehearsal of the girls participating in a 40 and 8 beauty pageant. In a preliminary game against Staunton, Handley's Whiz Kids defeated the Strasburg junior varsity. Before a game against Lexington, a game was played by the Pee-Wees, 5<sup>th</sup> and 6<sup>th</sup> graders at Handley. Handley defeated all their non-league District 5 foes except the second time against Martinsburg, a 44-36 loss. The Judges lost to Waynesboro, Virginia 46-44. They

had been leading by three points with less than a minute left. Ted Keller scored 22 points in that game—up to that time this was a Handley record for points by a player in a game. The Judges stayed overnight at Waynesboro before going to Lexington the next day and drove in a snowstorm before getting back to Handley at 1:00 AM. They failed to make the District 5 playoffs for 1948.

### **END NOTESS 1948-1949**

Handley had a good year in 1949. They won 15 games, losing 6 and made the playoffs for the first time in their history. They also played their first two overtime game in history, a 49-46 victory over Shepherdstown. The top four teams made it to a playoff held at VMI in Lexington. They had to go on the road three straight games to qualify. They beat Robert Lee, Waynesboro and Lexington to make it. The team left for VMI amid festivities at the Handley Library. However, they lost the first game 46-36 to Robert Lee and although it was a bitter loss that ended their season, it still was a great year.

### **END NOTES 1949-1950**

Following a good 1949 year, the Judges had a dismal 1950 season, only winning 5 games and losing 12 and missing the playoffs. One of the games was against EC Glass, the 1949 State Champ—a 63-31 loss for the Judges. They had lost only one game in 41 starts. Handley only scored one point in the last quarter. In the game against Shepherdstown, one of Handley's five wins, the Handley Whiz Kids defeated the Boyce Boys Club prior to the game. Again in 1950, the Judges had to go on the road for three straight games to Waynesboro, Staunton, and Lexington. They stayed overnight in Waynesboro, went to Staunton, and then back to stay another night in Waynesboro before going on to Lexington. In the game against Staunton, a Leeman player threw up a long shot to tie the game in the first over time. The Judges lost the game in the second overtime. It was the second year in a row that the Judges had played a two overtime game.

### **END NOTES 1950-1951**

The Judges had an 8 win and 12 loss season in 1951—not quite good enough to make the District 5 Tournament. In their first game against William Monroe, they sported new uniforms and warm up jackets. The Judges stayed overnight in Clifton Forge before going to Covington the next night. After the Covington game the team toured a paper mill as an educational project. Handley lost both games. Handley went through a stretch where they lost three games by a total of six points. In an upset, the Judges defeated Robert E. Lee, which was only their second loss of the season. They played one overtime game in 1951, a loss to Wilson Memorial. They beat Waynesboro on a last second field goal, 59-57. In a return game with Robert E. Lee, the Judges lost on a last second goal 56-54.

### **END NOTES 1951-1952**

Handley had one of the best seasons in their history in 1952. They won 18 games and lost only 4. Unfortunately, three of those games were against Harrisonburg—the last one knocking them out of the District 5 tournament and ending their season. They played one game in the afternoon, against Strasburg, and the JV's played against Randolph Macon before the game. The Judges went on the road to play Robert E. Lee, then went on to Waynesboro and spent the night before playing the Little Giants. Handley finished second to Harrisonburg who had beaten them twice during the regular season, 53-36 and 40-38. In the District 5 tournament held at the VMI field house in Lexington, the Judges beat Robert E. Lee in the first game, but in the championship game against Harrisonburg lost a heart breaker 41-40. The Streaks went ahead 41-40 on a foul shot with a little over a minute left to play. A Handley player was fouled with seconds to go and did not make the foul shots. Because only the tournament champion advanced to the state playoffs, Handley's season came to a bitter end.

### **END NOTES 1952-1953**

Handley had another good year in 1953, winning 18 games and losing 4. Unfortunately, two of those losses came at the hands of Harrisonburg, including one that knocked the Judges out of a state tournament bid. Handley was supposed to open up against Broadway, but because they were a new school, the gym was not finished. Handley played a 20 game regular season, with 11 on the road and 9 at home. One of their 4 losses was to Shepherdstown and the game was played at Shepherd College. Handley did manage to win one game from Harrisonburg, who were the defending state champs. In a game with Waynesboro Virginia, Handley had an eight point lead with a minute left, and hung on for a one point victory. In a win over Warren County, Handley had 30 points at the foul line. In the District 5 Tournament held at the VMI Field House in Lexington, Handley beat Montevideo 50-48 before losing the championship game to Harrisonburg 61-45 before 1700 screaming fans.

### **END NOTES 1953-1954**

Handley had a strange year in 1954. After starting out fast, they lost 7 of their last 10 games, and wound up tied with Broadway for the last spot in the District 5 tournament. In a play in game with Broadway for that spot, they lost 52-41. This year marked the first year the Judges had played Clarke County. In a game with Waynesboro, the Judges pulled out the victory on a last second shot that tied the game and a foul was called. The foul shot was made and the Judges won 41-40. The last second shot was possible via a stolen pass. In another game with Harrisonburg, the Judges tied the game in the final seconds and then a technical foul was called against Harrisonburg for calling too many time outs. The two foul shots were made and Handley won 52-50. In a game against Robert E. Lee, the Judges lost on a last second shot 47-46 from close to half court. The season record was 10-11.

### **END NOTES 1954-1955**

Handley had a good year in 1955. Their record was 13-6 and they made the District 5 playoffs. This would be the last year they would be in District 5. The league had grown to 18 teams, and it had to be divided. The Judges would play in District 10 in 1956. They played Broadway in the first game of the district playoffs, a team they had beaten twice. Unfortunately, they lost that game and their season ended. In a home game in the cracker box against Clarke County, the crowd got so loud that coach Maddox had to take the team out into the halls to give instruction. A Handley player set a school record for points in a game (Bill Hickerson) with 35 against Broadway.

### **END NOTES 1955-1956**

Handley had a great year in 1956. They set a record for points scored in one game (93) twice, went to the state tournament for the first time in their history, and entered a new league, District 10. The old District 5 had gotten too large, and it was divided in half, with Harrisonburg being the divider. They scored 93 points against Shepherdstown and Clarke County, surpassing the old mark of 83 in 1953. In a win over Warren County, the clock had stopped working and the Wildcat fans thought they had tied the game when in fact Handley won 48-46. They finally won at Harrisonburg for the first time in 18 years on a last second shot, 61-60. They also beat Montevideo on a last second shot, 51-49. In a game at Broadway, 300 fans had to be turned away and the principal had to issue an apology. More than 1000 fans jammed the gym. In beating Harrisonburg at home the win marked the first time the Judges had beaten Harrisonburg twice in a season. In the District 10 tournament, held at Robert E. Lee in Staunton, Handley beat Montevideo and Staunton to advance to the state tournament. In their first game they blew out Dan River. The state games were played at the VPI field house in Blacksburg. In the state semi final, they lost to James Monroe 54-46. They played a game for third place in the state, which the Judges lost to Clintwood 76-65. They finished fourth in the state, and ended the year with a fine 19-6 record.

### **END NOTES 1956-1957**

Handley had one of their best seasons in 1957 in the history of the school—and one of their most disappointing. They won 16 straight games before losing to Martinsburg and was 19-1 going into the District 10 tournament held at Broadway High School. After beating Strasburg they then faced James Wood for the title. It was the first time the two schools had ever met in any event except track. James Wood won the tournament title, knocking the Judges from a return trip to the state playoffs 57-45. They finished the year at 20-2. In this year Eddie Grim broke his own record for single game points. He tied the record against Harrisonburg with 36 points and broke it with 50 points against Elkton. The game against Elkton also tied a school record for total points at 93. Several times during the year the doors to the Handley gym had to be closed early because of large crowds.

### **END NOTES 1957-1958**

Handley had a strange year in 1958. Sporting a green team with almost no experience, they struggled at times during the regular season but in the end managed to make the District 10 finals for the second straight year. The Judges beat Luray on a last second shot. They also lost to Warren County on a last second shot. They lost to Montevideo twice, once on a last second shot. And they also lost to Martinsburg on a last second shot. And once again, they defeated Broadway in the last seconds. Handley returned the favor to Montevideo in the District 10 tournament semi finals, defeating them at Bridgewater College 40-39 before 1500 fans. At the end of the game, a jump ball appeared to end the game as Montevideo took the jump for the winning basket. But the officials ruled the jump ball was no good, and another jump ball resulted in the Judges getting the ball and held it as the final seconds ticked off. That set off another final with James Wood, the second straight year the two had tangled for the District tournament championship. In that game, James Wood won again, this time at the foul line, as the Judges had only 3 points out of 6 attempts, while the Colonels scored 24 points at the line. The championship game was played at Bridgewater College in front of 1700 fans. The Judges finished with a 13-9 record.

### **END NOTES 1958-1959**

The Judges had a good year in 1959. They finished with a 17-6 record and made the final game of the District 10 tournament. In this year it was decided to change the tournament format from four to eight teams. They finished in second place in District 10, missing out on the Evening Star and News Record trophy for the top team in the District. The tournament was held at Bridgewater College, and the Judges defeated Elkton first, then Turner Ashby to reach the final game against Montevideo. All these games were sell outs, with over 2000 fans attending the tournament. In the final game against Montevideo, the Judges only scored 29 points, and only went to the foul line once the whole game. The final score was 48-29 and the Judges season for 1959 ended.

### **END NOTES 1959-1960**

Handley had a great year in 1960. They only lost two games; one in overtime, but the second loss was in the District 10 playoff game, to Stonewall Jackson of Mt. Jackson, that ended their season. In wins against Luray and Harrisonburg, both teams only managed to score one point in a quarter. Charles Town had built a brand new gym, and the Judges whipped them 67-43. Against Strasburg, in which the doors were shut down a half hour before the game, the entire Strasburg team fouled out, one getting kicked out all together. Handley score 35 points from the foul line in a 73-55 win. In the first loss to Montevideo, that went two overtimes, Handley made a basket at the end to tie the game but it was ruled the player was out of bounds. They played a new consolidated school from Woodstock, Central, and won. When Charles Town came to Winchester, again the doors had to be shut down, and the Judges made a furious comeback at the end to win 55-52. In the end the Judges had to have a play in game with Stonewall Jackson, Mt. Jackson, to enter the playoffs. The Judges had beaten them twice during the regular season. This game went into overtime and the Judges lost 43-39. The referees were

questionable, as Stonewall Jackson went to the foul line 24 times to the Judges 12. Handley did not score in overtime. Their season ended with a fine 15-2 record.

### **END NOTE 1960-1961**

In 1960 a meeting was held at Loudoun County High School. As a result, a new league was formed called the Northwestern District League. The three chairmen were Garland Quarles, superintendent of Winchester public schools, James Gordon, principal of James Wood, and Robert Wood, principal of Warren County. Six schools were entered— Loudoun County, Warren County, George Mason, Herndon, Handley and James Wood. The new district was put in Virginia Group 1B. Handley had a great year in the new league. They won the regular season title, not losing a game. Games scheduled against Harrisonburg and Montevideo were cancelled because of snow. They only lost one game during the regular season, a non-district one in an upset to Strasburg. However, in the tournament held at Shepherd College, they lost to James Wood 48-45 after beating George Mason 66-45. The game with James Wood was played before over 1200 fans. Handley ended the year with a great 16-2 record.

### **END NOTES 1961-1962**

Although the Judges had advanced to the state tournament and advanced in 1956, they never had made it to the final game. 1962 marked the first year they had advanced to the state final, and finished with a great 20-5 record. In the regular season, they lost to Albemarle twice, by three points, once to Frederick, Maryland by three points, and once to Broadway by one point. In their first game with Strasburg, they led 39-7 at half. They defeated twice a new school in Front Royal, John Mosby Academy. In the first loss to Albemarle, Phil Newcome, who became the second player in Handley history to score over 1000 points in his career, (the first was Eddie Grim), was hobbled by a bad ankle. In the Frederick, Maryland loss, Frederick was the defending Maryland state champs, the Judges lost the game at the foul line. The Judges would avenge that defeat later in the year. It was in the second Frederick game that Newcome passed the 1000 point total. In the loss to Broadway, the Judges blew a 16 point lead. Broadway was undefeated at the time in District 10. Once again, they lost this game at the foul line. The game was tied 50-50 when Broadway made a foul shot. A last second shot by the Judges fell short. In the Northwest District Tournament, Handley won over Herndon at George Mason High School. The final game of the tournament was held at John Mosby High School, which sported a 2000 seat gym. They would play George Mason, who upset undefeated James Wood. Handley won by 10 points over George Mason, thus punching their ticket to the region tournament to be held at Memorial gym in Charlottesville. Over 2000 fans witnessed the game at John Mosby. In Charlottesville, Handley faced Orange County, and the lead changed hands over twenty times before the Judges put them away 69-56. The next night the Judges would play James Monroe, for the right to go to Blacksburg (VPI) for the state final. The James Monroe game was a classic, going into overtime. In the overtime, Monroe went up 57-55 and then tried to freeze the ball to end the game. Handley fouled and Monroe made one foul shot, sending them up by three. But Handley scored to cut the lead to one, and then fouled a Monroe player. He missed the shot, giving

the Judges the ball with 37 seconds left. With nine seconds left, Newcome hit the shot that won the game 59-58 and sent the Judges into the state final game with Pulaski County.

### **END NOTES 1962-1963**

Handley had another great year in 1963. They won the Northwestern District regular season and then won the Northwestern District Tournament. Had it not been for James Monroe, they probably would have gone to states. Handley played James Monroe three times in 1963, and lost all three. Twice during the regular season by wide margins and then lost a cliff hanger to them in the regionals. They also split with a new team this year, South Hagerstown. This also marked the first year that James Wood was added to the regular season and they split two cliff hangers. Handley won the first game with the Colonels on foul shots. This game was played at Shepherd College and some of the fans had to be turned away. With 15 seconds left to play and James Wood clinging to a 47-46 lead, Handley shot two foul shots to end the game 48-47. Handley also beat South Hagerstown at the foul line 72-68. In the second game with James Wood, held at John Mosby Academy, no tickets were sold at the door, as the game was a complete sell out. In this game, which went into overtime, the Judges had a chance to win in regulation, but with seconds left, a Handley shooter could only make 1 of 2 to force overtime instead of a victory. James Wood won 60-58. Handley was also upset by Broadway, who stole the ball from the Judges in the last seconds to win 57-56. In the Northwestern District Tournament, held at Loudoun Valley, Handley beat Herndon 70-47 to play in the title game against James Wood. Handley won the tournament title by beating the Colonels 57-49, thus earning a trip to the regionals. Over 1200 fans attended the game and some had to be turned away. They faced James Monroe, a team that had beat the Judges handily twice, 66-47 and 64-46. This time it was a lot closer, but James Monroe won again, 56-54, ending another great year at 15-6.

### **END NOTES 1963-1964**

The Judges had a good year in 1964. They lost only four games, and won the NW District regular season title. However, one of the losses was to Herndon, a team they had defeated twice during the season, and that loss was in the first game of the NW District tournament thus ending their season. The Handley Alumni were also beaten by the JW Alumni this year, 98-91. In a game with Fauquier at Handley, the game was held up for over three minutes as the ball got lost in the stands. Handley played James Wood twice, once at John Mosby Academy in Front Royal. Robert Lee of Staunton beat the Judges once, but then the Judges returned the favor and snapped Lee's 11 game winning streak. They also defeated James Monroe twice, the 1963 State Champs-once on a last second shot. In the second game with James Wood, the Colonels snapped the Judges 10 game winning streak. The game was played in Purcellville. In the tournament game with Herndon held at Warrenton that ended their season, in overtime, Handley led 51-49 with 10 seconds left when Herndon stole the ball and went in to tie the game. Handley was ahead 55-51 in overtime but lost the game 57-55.



## **END NOTES 1964-1965**

Handley had a strange year in 1965. They were very young and inexperienced and had no height to speak of. Yet they managed to stage one of the greatest upsets in Handley basketball history and managed to make it to the championship game of the Northwestern District tournament. They also had another great upset, in beating Albemarle in three overtimes 70-66. In the biggest upset, they beat the state bound James Wood Colonels 44-37 at Shepherd College before over 1000 fans. In the second James Wood game, played in Warrenton, the Colonels got even 53-39 before over 1600 fans. In losing twice to Martinsburg West Virginia, the Bulldogs swept the Judges in both football and basketball for the first time in over twenty years. In the second loss to the Bulldogs it was the first home loss for the Judges since 1962. They also lost some games they should have won. In the NW District tournament, they defeated Fauquier at Loudoun Valley, and then beat George Mason at George Marshall High School in Falls Church. In the rubber match with the state bound Colonels, they finally ended their season by losing 54-47. All told, their record was a respectful 12-9.

## **END NOTES 1965-1966**

Handley had a good year in 1966, going 15-5. During the year, the Globetrotters came to the Handley gym, and the Handley Alumni lost to the JW Alumni 91-83 in the brand new Frederick County Jr. High gym. They also beat Martinsburg in Martinsburg for the first time in 12 years. They beat James Wood twice in the new Frederick County Jr. High gym, but lost when it counted when the Colonels beat them in the new gym in the semi finals of the NW District tournament. In the second win over Martinsburg, it was the first time since 1952 they had swept the Bulldogs. In a win over Fauquier, the Judges came back from a 16 point deficit to win. In a loss to Herndon in the cracker box, 54-49, it was the first district loss at home in over six years. In the last regular season game at home against George Mason, a 59-58 loss, marked the last game ever to be played in the famed crack box. In the title game against James Wood at the new Frederick County Jr. High gym, a Handley loss 52-44, the biggest crowd ever to see a Winchester basketball game was on hand.

## **END NOTES 1966-1967**

The Judges started out the 1966-1967 year on a great note. They played their first game in the brand new gym at Handley and before 1900 fans, beat James Wood 61-46. They also had a high scoring transfer from Douglas High School who contributed to the early season success of the team. They went 15-6 and made it to the championship of the Northwestern District Tournament. This year, however, Loudoun County was the team to beat. Handley lost to them twice-including the tournament championship game. They won their first eight games. In the eighth game against George Mason, the Mustangs were charged with 25 personal fouls, four technicals, and one player was ejected from the game. Handley also lost twice to Robert Lee of Staunton, once in overtime. In the first game against Lee, the Judges only scored 28 points-a 10 year low for the team. More trouble came later as the Douglas transferee was suspended from the team for scholastic

reasons. In a game with James Wood at their new gym, 250 fans had to be turned away. The doors opened at 5:45 and were closed at 6:15. The Judges clinched the regular season championship with a second win over George Mason in Falls Church. In the NW District tournament, Handley beat Herndon at Loudoun Valley High School, and then took care of Fauquier in the new Handley gym. Their season ended however the next night at Handley when they lost to Loudoun county 60-55. The foul line won it for the Raiders, as they made 32 of 40 foul shots for an 80% advantage.

### **END NOTES 1967-1968**

Jimmy Omph made his debut as coach on a rare afternoon game against Martinsburg. Controversy followed as time ran out with the Judges leading by two, but the referee allowed Martinsburg to shoot free throws after the buzzer sounded. The player missed both to give Handley the win by two points. James Wood beat the Judges on a last shot with 22 seconds left to play. In the second game against James Wood, over 2100 fans crammed in the Handley gym to see the Judges win 60-53. It was the largest crowd ever to see a basketball game in Winchester. In the NW District Tournament, Handley again met James Wood in the final game and won 51-44. It was the Judges first NW district tournament title since 1963. In the regionals held in Charlottesville, Handley defeated Varina to advance to the regional final game against Harrisonburg, a team that had already beaten the Judges twice during the regular season. This game was no different as the Blue Streaks won 61-41. This regional final game was also considered a state semi final game, as Harrisonburg and Blacksburg met for the state title in the next game. Over 6500 fans witnessed the Handley-Harrisonburg game. The Judges finished the year 16-6.

### **END NOTES 1968-1969**

Handley had another good year in 1969. They won the regular season NW District title and the NW District tournament title as well. By winning the regular season title, they gained an automatic berth in the regionals. Also in this year long time coach Hunter Maddox was presented with the keys to a new car in recognition of his years of service to the school. In this year, the Judges Alumni lost to the Colonels Alumni 90-82. In a game against Robert Lee, the Judges lost 59-56 in the final 23 seconds. In a loss to James Wood, the Judges lost the game at the foul line, going 10-51. In the NW District tournament held at Frederick County Junior High School, the Judges beat Loudoun Valley and then Loudoun County to win the tournament title. They faced Amherst County in the regionals and once again the foul line killed the Judges. They made only 10 out of 24 as Amherst made 23-32. They lost the game 57-48. Their record for the year was 16-5.

### **END NOTES 1969-1970**

Handley had one of their best seasons in history in 1970. They won 21 games and only lost two. Unfortunately, two of those losses came against Robert E. Lee, one in the regional final which was also the state semi final. Lee lost the final game against John

Langston by three points. In this year Handley had a 17 game winning streak and won their third straight NW Tournament title. In a game against Loudoun Valley, Handley survived 43 personal fouls. In this year the Handley Alumni beat James Wood's Alumni 76-71. They had played for six years and this was the Judges' second win. Proceeds went to both schools booster clubs. Also this year it was determined that the following year both schools would enter the new Commonwealth District, an AAA league. The Judges joined, even though they only had 835 students to James Wood's 1578. Handley had 28 turnovers in the first loss to Lee, but beat them later in the season at Handley. They also beat a strong Harrisonburg team twice, once by only one point. The last shot by Harrisonburg for the win hit the rim and bounced out. In the win against Lee, it was their first loss of the season. The Judges also won their third straight NW regular season title. It was the first time they went undefeated in the league since its formation in 1961. In the first round of the NW tournament, held at Purcellville, the Judges beat Broad Run, then came back to Handley and beat Warren County and Loudoun Valley for the title. In the regional game, held at Charlottesville, the Judges beat Culpeper easily, before losing to Lee in the regional/state semi final game. That loss snapped a 17 game Judges winning streak. Overall, a great season, finishing 21-2.

### **END NOTES 1970-1971**

Although a small school by attendance figures, Handley went into the larger AAA class in 1971 and became a member of the Commonwealth District. That meant playing bigger schools around the DC area. They proved they belonged, as they won the regular season championship. They beat Robert E. Lee in an upset, but lost the second game with them on the road, a game that broke their eight game winning streak. They also defeated James Wood in the annual alumni game. In another upset, they defeated Albemarle in an upset. In a slow down game against Lane, Handley managed to win 17-16. They led 12-3 at half. In another slow down game, the Judges lost their first district game in a return match with Albemarle, 38-37. The Judges lost another district game to Garfield on a shot with three seconds left in overtime. In winning the Commonwealth District regular season title (it was their fourth straight district crown) they had the top seed in the tournament. In the tournament game with Osbourn, the Judges faced another slowdown and lost 38-34. By winning the regular season, they still had a regional game but first they had to play the tournament champion to determine what seed they would be in the regionals. They lost to Albemarle 45-41. The district tournament was held at Fauquier High School. In the regionals at Charlottesville, the Judges ran into a tough Jefferson Senior High School squad (Roanoke). They lost 75-43, ending their season at 15-6.

### **END NOTES 1971-1972**

Handley had an average year in 1972, winning 12 and losing 8. In a game with unbeaten Stafford, the Judges scored a basket with one second remaining to win 72-70. In the annual JW-Handley Alumni game, the Judges lost 63-49. In a game with James Wood, a Handley player scored 10 points in the last quarter to enable the Judges to pull out a 45-42 win. In a game with Woodbridge, two Handley players combined for 68 points in a 85-83 win. In the first round of the Commonwealth District tournament, held at Handley,

the Judges knocked off Stonewall Jackson of Manassas 70-63. In the semi finals, the Judges lost to Woodbridge at Charlottesville in a slow down game 38-37. With 19 seconds left in the game the Judges were called for a five second violation while trying to inbound the ball. Woodbridge went the length of the court to score and a last second shot by the Judges was not enough to pull out the win.

### **END NOTES 1972-1973**

Playing for the third year in AAA, the Judges had another average year in 1973. They won 12 and lost 9. They beat Osbourn with a bucket with less than a minute to play. In a game against Garfield, a Handley player dunked the ball in warm-ups and the team was given a technical foul. Before the game even started, Handley was behind 1-0. In a game against Woodbridge, Handley slowed the game down and held Woodbridge to a total of four field goals for the entire game. The Judges had just three points in the entire first half. No one scored in the second quarter. The James Wood Alumni defeated the Judges Alumni 76-73. Against James Monroe, the Judges had to play against a six foot eight inch 300 pound center. This year the Judges beat James Wood by getting a bucket with one second left in the game. The Judges were eliminated from the Commonwealth District tournament by losing to Albemarle 69-63. The game was played at Garfield High School in Dale City.

### **END NOTES 1973-1974**

Handley had a difficult year in 1974. They won four of their first five games, but ended up with a 9-13 record in the rugged Commonwealth District. In a game with Stonewall Jackson Manassas, Tony Roberts set a rebounding record with 33. In this year the Judges beat James Wood in their annual Alumni game 61-60. The Judges lost a game to Fauquier at the foul line, as the Falcons made 23 of 34 while Handley went 8 of 18. The Judges lost a game to James Monroe on a shot with 54 seconds left, 46-45. In a game against unbeaten Lane High, the Judges won on a shot with 11 seconds left to win 66-64. In a game against Stafford, the Judges tied the game up with six seconds to play and then won the game in overtime. In this game, an official had to view a video to determine who on the Stafford team would shoot a foul shot. This year also James Wood defeated Handley for the first time in five years. In the Commonwealth District tournament, held at Stonewall Jackson High in Manassas, the Judges let a big lead melt away and lost to Lane 67-57.

### **END NOTES 1974-1975**

Handley had a strange year in 1975. They left the AAA Commonwealth District to go back to the Northwestern District, with teams closer to their enrollment. They had a new coach, Bill Isherwood, who this year would miss three games due to health reasons. They won their first six games, and then lost their next six. They played Clarke County in the Shenandoah College gym. They lost to James Wood twice for the first time in six years. They lost several games at the foul line this year-in the first James Wood game the Colonels made 29 of 34 attempts. In the Broad Run game, the Spartans made 31 of 41.

They beat Broad Run in the second game to finish second in the district, only to lose that position on a coin toss and were placed third. The Judges won their first tournament game against Loudoun County at the Frederick County Middle school gym, and then traveled to WT Woodson High in Fairfax to defeat Broad Run. That win assured them of a regional berth. In the championship game of the district, the Judges were defeated for the third time by Loudoun Valley at Woodson High. They traveled to Chester Virginia, near Richmond, to face Majorca in the regionals. The Judges started out with a stall, and then began to run with the Warriors. In the end, the Judges lost to Majorca 59-51, thus ending their roller coaster season at 15-9.

### **END NOTES 1975-1976**

The Judges had a good year in 1976. They went undefeated at home and won the Northwestern District regular season title plus the tournament title. In a loss to Loudoun Valley, the Vikings hit on 24 of 30 foul shots to win the game. In a 71-70 win over Turner Ashby, the Judges worked the ball around until the final four seconds, and then hit a shot that won the game. In the return game with Valley, so many fouls were called that the Viking coach stated in the paper that it was the worse display of officiating that he had ever seen. In a surprise, Clarke County forced the Judges into overtime before the Judges finally won. In a game with George Mason in the opening three minutes of the game, the scoreboard clock quit working, causing a ten minute delay. The Judges won that game and clinched the regular season championship. In the Northwestern District tournament, held in the Frederick County Junior High School gym, the Judges beat Loudoun County by five points and then held off Broad Run by a single point 61-60. In the regionals, held at JMU, the Judges ran into a hot Robert E. Lee team that ended their season 64-46. The final record for 1976 was 17-7.

### **END NOTES 1976-1977**

Handley had a great year in 1977. They won both the Northwestern District regular season and tournament titles. They were the second team to win a region championship (1962) and the fourth team to advance to the state tournament, this year being their first trip since 1970. They defeated Harrisonburg two out of three times, the last being a two point win over them with sophomore Ralph Sampson. However in the state final four, they ran into a strong Forest Glen team who beat them 89-53. In a loss to Loudoun Valley, the Judges turned the ball over 26 times and lost on a shot with 18 seconds left in the game. Then the very next game they lost to James Wood who made the winning foul shots with six seconds left in the game. In the return match with Loudoun Valley, the Judges made a shot with one second left in overtime to win. In the opening round of the district tournament, the Judges had to make a shot with four seconds left to beat Broad Run by one point, then traveled to host Park View to defeat both Warren County and Loudoun Valley. The Judges won the game against Valley at the foul line, making 26 of 33 attempts. In the regionals held at JMU, the Judges beat Sampson and the Blue Streaks by two points and then defeated James Monroe by just a point to win their first region title and advance to the state tournament. Against Forest Glen, the Judges played poorly, but the Rangers were just too strong. Handley finished the year 20-6.

## **END NOTES 1977-1978**

The Judges had a strange year in 1978. They had many games cancelled due to the weather. The NW tournament was moved to Park View from Handley when of all things a coal strike forced the Judges to cut back on their power consumption. In a game with George Mason, the Judges stole the ball with 25 seconds left and scored the winning basket. The Judges upset an undefeated Warren County team this year. Clarke County defeated the Judges twice this year. It was the first time the Eagles had ever defeated the Judges in basketball. Handley defeated James Wood twice for the first Judges' sweep in five years. In a win over Turner Ashby, a Black Knight player was ejected from the game in the last seconds and the Judges won 57-54. In a loss to Park View, the Patriots won on a last second shot 62-61. Coach Isherwood did not make the trip due to sickness. The Judges defeated Loudoun County who had suspended two of their tallest players due to academics. In the NW district tournament first round, the Judges finally defeated Clarke County in Berryville after losing to them twice during the season. In the second round at Park View High School, Loudoun Valley defeated the Judges for the third time to end their season at 12-10.

## **END NOTES 1978-1979**

Handley had a good year in 1979. They set a new team scoring record by beating Broad Run 95-69. The old record was 93 in 1957. Then the next time they played Broad Run they set another record by scoring 100 points in a 100-43 win. Handley beat James Wood with a shot in the last minute. In an overtime win over Loudoun Valley, the Judges scored the winning basket with only four seconds left to play. The Judges were third in the district during the regular season, but won the NW district tournament played at Handley by beating Warren County, Loudoun Valley, and Loudoun County. County was the regular season winner. In the regionals held at JMU, the Judges defeated Louisa 57-46. The next night they had to face an undefeated Harrisonburg team which featured Ralph Sampson. The Judges lost that game to Harrisonburg 73-52, ending their season at 19-6.

## **END NOTES 1979-1980**

Handley had another good year in 1980. This year they won the NW regular season title. In a loss to George Mason, the Judges shot 16 for 61. In a one point loss to James Wood, the lead changed hands three times in the last 30 seconds. James Wood took a shot with no time left to win the game, and the shot was contested by the Judges who thought that time had ran out. Handley won a game against Osbourn with a last second shot. The Judges clinched the regular season title by beating Warren County 70-67. Coach Isherwood won his 100<sup>th</sup> game with a win over Broad Run. The Judges went 18-2 in the regular season, losing only to James Wood and George Mason. In the first round of the NW district tournament held at Park View, the Judges were upset by last seed Osbourn Park 54-53. Because they won the regular season title, Handley was still going to the regionals. But once again, they met a strong Harrisonburg team at JMU and lost 64-49. They finished the season with a great 18-4 record.

## **END NOTES 1980-1981**

The Judges in 1981 had an up and down year in 1981. It started from the very first game when two starters were out due to injuries. And in a couple of games, their leading scorer was absent due to disciplinary actions. The season showed some bits of promise, as they knocked off the top team in the district, Park View, by using a slowdown and hitting a shot to win with two seconds left. In another close game with Broad Run, the Judges hit two foul shots with three seconds left to win the game 46-44. The Judges blew a nine point lead with five minutes left in a loss to Warren County. In a loss to Loudoun Valley, a Valley player hit three free throws in the last 19 seconds to beat the Judges 59-56. The Judges beat Loudoun County with a layup with two seconds left in the game. The Judges defeated Broad Run the second time in overtime, despite a Spartan player scoring 43 points. In one of the strangest games of the year at Loudoun Valley, a Handley player missed a technical foul shot with one second left that would have won the game. The Judges lost in overtime. In the NW district tournament against Osbourn Park, the Jackets missed a layup as time ran out and the Judges won 48-47. In the championship game against Park View, the Patriots eliminated the Judges on a last second shot 41-39. Their record for 1981 was 9-11.

## **END NOTES 1981-1982**

1982 was one of the strangest years in Handley basketball history. They were supposed to open up against Osbourn Park, but the game was cancelled due to the death of track coach Gary Brown. In the Hedgesville Christmas tournament, they beat Greencastle Pa. despite only scoring two points in the last quarter. They beat Smithsburg Md. for the title. They won two squeakers—one against Osbourn when a Handley player scored five points in the last 40 seconds. In the other squeaker, they lost to Osbourn Park when a shot to tie the game went in—and out—of the basket. Against Clarke County, the Eagles missed a 1 and 1 with seconds to play—Handley won 48-46. In an overtime loss to James Wood, the Judges missed two foul shots with a minute left that would have won the game in regulation. They beat Loudoun County when they made six foul shots in the final seconds 72-71. In the opening round of the NW district tournament, the Judges played slow down ball and lost 31-21. Their leading rebounder was suspended before the game. The tallest player on the Judges team in 1982 was only six foot three. Their record was 8-13.

## **END NOTES 1982-1983**

The Judges had a very young and inexperienced team in 1983. As a result, they had a bad year by Handley standards. They lost a lot of close games, and just about every team had a height advantage over them. They lost a game to Loudoun Valley in the last two minutes with a lead and the ball. They lost a game to Broad Run when the Spartans made 32 of 35 foul shots. In a game with Robert Lee, they were outscored 25-2 in the last quarter. They did manage to win the Christmas Holiday tournament at Hedgesville for the second year in a row by beating Smithsburg Md. and Greencastle Pa. They defeated

Osborn with a shot in the last 20 seconds of play in overtime. They lost a game against Loudoun County in the last two minutes with a four point lead by turning the ball over five times. In the second game against James Wood, who had buried the Judges in the first game, Handley had a four point lead with less than a minute left, and with one second left on the clock, James Wood hit two free throws to send the game into overtime. James Wood won by one point on a shot with 50 seconds to play. This year, James Wood would advance to the state final four. In the NW district tournament, the Judges lost the first round game to Osborn. The record for 1983 was 6-14.

#### **END NOTES 1983-1984**

The Judges had a rough year in 1984. Their schedule included two games with eventual state champ Robert E. Lee, who had a high school all American as well as Park View who had their own all American. And they had to play James Wood, who were ranked in the top five in AAA. In the Winchester Star Apple Capital Basketball Classic, they nearly knocked off Lee, losing 66-62. There were 1100 fans in the Handley gym to witness the battle. In a game against Osborn Park, the Judges trailed by 10 points with a little over a minute to play and won at the buzzer 63-61. In the return game against the same team, the Judges made up 15 points but lost by 2 at the end. In a win over Loudoun County, the Judges hit a 30 foot jumper at the buzzer to win. In the NW District tournament first round game at Handley, the Judges beat Broad Run with two free throws with 30 seconds left to win 55-53. In the next round, held at Park View High School, the Judges defeated Warren County, a team that had beaten them three times before, once in the consolation game of the Winchester Star Apple Capital Basketball Classic. In the final game of the tournament, the Judges lost to Osborn Park by three points in the last 21 seconds of the game. They finished the year 11-12. Also this year, the Washington Redskins came to Handley for a charity game and beat a group of all-stars 98-95

#### **END NOTES 1984-1985**

Handley had one of their best seasons in history in 1985. They only lost three games all year, two in the regular season to Harrisonburg and Martinsburg and one in the regional's that ended their season. They were ranked in the top ten to start the year. In a win over Martinsburg, the Morgan brothers, Jason and John, scored 54 of the Judges 68 points in a 68-62 victory. In a game against Loudoun County, tempers flared when one of the Judges was under cut on the way to the basket. The Judges committed three technical fouls, but still pulled out the win 67-56. The Judges defeated Loudoun Valley 63-62 on a shot with 31 seconds left to win the game. In a win over Park View, the Park View coach was thrown out of the game after receiving two technicals. Counting the consolation game of the Winchester Star Apple Capital Classic, the Judges defeated James Wood three times in 1985. They won the NW district and tournament titles. In a game with Clarke County, the Morgan brothers accounted for 50 of Handley's 78 points. They finished the regular season undefeated in the district. This year marked the 9<sup>th</sup> time in the 25 year history of the NW that the Judges won the NW district tournament. The season came to an end at Spotswood High School in the region semi final when Spotsylvania beat the Judges 61-57. They finished the year 20-3.



## **END NOTES 1985-1986**

Handley had a good year in 1986. Although they finished the year 17-8, they won the Winchester Star Apple Capital Classic by beating Clarke and Warren Counties. They won the NW District Tournament by beating Broad Run, Osbourn, and Loudoun Valley. They also won their opening regional game, defeating Spotsylvania before losing to Robert E. Lee in the semi finals. In a game against Loudoun Valley, in which the Judges lost in 2 overtimes, a shot by a Handley player in the first overtime with two seconds left forced a second overtime. Valley won the game in the last two seconds of the second overtime. In an overtime win over Osbourn, the Judges won it on two foul shots with eight seconds left. Handley beat Harrisonburg with a shot with six seconds left. Handley lost a game at Park View by one point with a turnover under their own basket with seconds left. The Judges lost a game against 6<sup>th</sup> ranked Martinsburg when a Bulldog player hit a shot at the buzzer. The NW district tournament in 1986 was held at Osbourn High School. Their tournament title this year was the 10<sup>th</sup> time in 26 years that Handley had won the tournament title.

## **END NOTES 1986-1987**

In 1987, Coach Isherwood retired and Tom Dixon took over as varsity coach. The Judges had a successful year in 1987, going 16-7 and reaching the championship game of the NW district tournament. In an overtime loss to Loudoun Valley, the Vikings made two foul shots with 9 seconds left in the game to win. They played the two time defending West Virginia AAA state champs, Stonewall Jackson of Charleston West Virginia in the opening game of the Martinsburg Holiday Classic and lost 72-56 but defeated Weir West Virginia in the consolation game 55-38. In a win over James Wood over 1300 fans showed up at James Wood. Handley won a game against Harrisonburg on a shot with 4 seconds left. They lost a game to Osbourn in two overtimes and then won against Broad Run in 3 overtimes by one point. Handley lost another game to Osbourn by going only 9 for 21 at the foul line. In a wild game against Park View, the Judges scored 16 points in the last three minutes—including two technical fouls against the Patriots. Osbourn also defeated Handley in the championship game of the NW district tournament 59-55. The tournament in 1987 was held at Handley.

## **END NOTES 1987-1988**

Handley had a successful but strange year in 1988. They won their first eight games before losing to Martinsburg. At the end of the regular season they had to play Loudoun Valley in a special game to determine the regular season NW district winner. They lost that game to Valley to finish second in the league. Along the way they defeated Broad Run on a last second shot and survived a near riot after a game with James Wood. Fights broke out in the Handley parking lot as well as other sites around Winchester. A Handley student was stabbed in the back and sent to the emergency room. When over 100 students went to the emergency room, another fight broke out in the hospital's parking lot. The game was played out in front of over 1500 fans at Handley and the AD had to turn fans

away. The Judges lost a game to Park View in the last seconds when an inbound pass was intercepted and a Patriot player scored at the buzzer. They lost a game against Harrisonburg by one point on two free throws in the last seconds. In a home game against Warren County, the game was held up twenty minutes because of a power failure. During this game, Handley's leading scorer was ejected for throwing the ball at a referee. This year was the first year of the three point shot. The Judges beat Warren County in the first game of the NW tournament, but then ended their season with a loss to Broad Run. Their record in 1988 was 16-7.

### **END NOTES 1988-1989**

Handley had another good year in 1989. They defeated James Wood three times in 1989—once in the Martinsburg Christmas Invitational tournament in the consolation game. The Judges lost the first game to Oak Hill West Virginia, the 5<sup>th</sup> ranked AAA team in WVA. 66-57. They beat James Wood 48-46 on a last second shot. They defeated Harrisonburg in two overtimes on a shot with six seconds left. They lost a game to Loudoun Valley by twenty points--Valley made 30 of 45 foul shots in the game. In a loss to Loudoun County, Clarence Morgan scored 40 points—at that time second only to Eddie Grim's 50 in 1957. They lost twice in the regular season to 3<sup>rd</sup> ranked Osbourn before beating them in the district tournament. In a rough game against Osbourn, the Judges racked up three technical fouls. Although they lost the NW district tournament championship to Loudoun Valley, they qualified for the regionals (Valley was the regular season champ.) They lost in the regionals to Louisa 79-72 at the foul line. Louisa went 25-28 at the line. Their record for 1989 was 15-9.

### **END NOTES 1989-1990**

The Judges had a good year in 1990. They made it to the championship game of the NW District Tournament where they lost in overtime to Broad Run at Osbourn High School. They qualified for the regionals despite the loss (Broad Run was the regular season champ) and traveled to Spotswood High School where they lost to James Monroe. They had a very hard schedule in 1990, losing twice to top ranked Martinsburg, losing to prep power Penn Manor from Pennsylvania (whose coach had coached at Daniel Morgan) and losing to prep school Saint Stephens of Alexandria. They also lost twice to Harrisonburg, whose front line averaged six foot five inches. The Judges defeated James Wood on a last second shot 73-72. They also beat Park View on a steal and basket at the buzzer. They also won a game against Loudoun Valley on a tip in at the buzzer. In a loss at Harrisonburg, the Streak went to the foul line 37 times—they shot more free throws than field goals. During this year, Handley's Clarence Morgan became the Judges' third player to break the 1000 point total for his career, joining Eddie Grim and Phil Newcome. Their final record for the year 1990 was 14-10.

### **END NOTES 1990-1991**

The Judges had a subpar year in 1991. The bright spot of the year was the Judges winning the Holiday Shootout at Shepherd College, beating Martinsburg and Jefferson County. In the Jefferson County game, the Judges stole an inbounds pass and scored the winning basket at the end of the game. The Judges lost a game at Harrisonburg when the Streaks made 30 of 40 free throws in the game. They lost a game to Broad Run when their star player scored 47 points. In a loss to Loudoun County, the Judges turned the ball over 33 times. In a 2 point loss to James Wood, the tying bucket for the Judges rolled off the rim as time expired. Handley won the rematch with Harrisonburg. But in that game they did not go to the foul line one time. In another loss to Loudoun County, Tommy Dixon received a double technical foul. In a loss to Park View, the Judges scored only two points in the second quarter. James Wood swept the season series for the first time since 1984. The Judges lost in the first game of the NW tournament to Osbourn at Warren County High School. Their record for 1991 was 9-12.

### **END NOTES 1991-1992**

Although the Judges' record was almost the same this year as in 1991, there were some differences. Once again they played in the Shenandoah Federal Holiday Shoot Out at Shepherd College, but they lost both games to Jefferson and Hedgesville. In a one point loss to James Wood Handley's coach got a technical. Handley led 59-54 with one minute left in the game. In a loss to Briar Woods, Handley gave up 32 4th quarter points. In a one point loss to Culpeper, Handley missed three shots at the buzzer that could have won the game. In a wild 49-48 overtime loss to James Wood, the Judges sent the game in overtime with a basket with two seconds left. In overtime, the clock was slow in starting; allowing James Wood to work the ball longer and a three point shot with two seconds left game James Wood the game. Handley was at the line for two foul shots with no time showing on the clock with a chance to win or tie the game but missed both shots. They finished up tied for the NW district regular season title with Broad Run, forcing a playoff game Park View to determine the regular season winner. They lost that game 86-72, finishing second in the district. In the NW district tournament first round game, the Judges were upset by 3-17 Loudoun Valley 54-51, ending their season at 9-13.

### **END NOTES 1992-1993**

The Judges had another subpar year in 1993. It was the third year in a row that they finished under 500-finishing the year at 10-11. In a 77-44 loss to Harrisonburg, Coach Dixon remarked about the game, "It was the worst display of basketball I've seen in 17 years of coaching." In that game the Judges hit only 17 of 64 field goal attempts. In a win over Park View, the Judges were red hot, hitting their first eight three point shots. In the return game with Park View, Handley let a 10 point lead in the last quarter slip away—with a little help from the refs. A call was reversed from a block to an intentional foul 10 seconds later, giving Park View a three point lead. The Judges did manage to get off two 3 point shots at the end to tie but both missed. Handley lost a squeaker to Warren County in overtime when a Wildcat player hit a clutch shot in the last seconds to send the game in overtime. In a loss to Loudoun County, the Raiders won on the boards, getting 42

rebounds. In a first round game of the NW district tournament at Handley, the Judges rallied from 16 points down to lose 57-55 to Park View.

#### **END NOTES 1993-1994**

The Judges had an average year in 1994, going 11-10. Because the football team went deep in the playoffs, a few of the players had to take some extra time to get into basketball shape. In a game against James Wood, the Judges won the game in the last quarter, scoring 33 points. In the Blue Ridge Bank Holiday Shootout at Shepherd College, the Judges lost the opener to Jefferson but managed to take third place by beating Keyser. The Judges started 1994 with seven straight road games. In a road game against Loudoun County, five players were left behind when they were late for the bus. The Judges still won the game 65-57. In the return game with Loudoun County, the Judges won again on a last second shot from the foul line 66-64. In the NW district tournament, the Judges beat Broad Run in Ashburn and then defeated regular season champion Warren County at Osbourn High School 77-69. In the championship game at Osbourn the Judges lost to Osbourn 58-43, ending their season at 11-10.

#### **END NOTES 1994-1995**

Handley had a good year in 1995. They won the NW district tournament with three wins over James Wood (3 times in 1995), Park View and Liberty. The opening game was played at Handley and the tournament finished up at Sherando High School. In the opening game of the season, the Judges won over Loudoun County 65-64, hitting a three point shot with 16 seconds left in the game. The Judges blew a 52-37 lead against Park View in an 82-69 loss. In a loss to Liberty, the Judges lost 76-74 on a three point shot by Liberty at the buzzer. In a one point loss to Osbourn, the Judges missed a foul shot with 11 seconds left that could have tied the game. In an overtime win over Park View, the Judges tied the game on a three point shot with 30 seconds left. Handley snapped Clarke County's 17 game winning streak with a 60-48 win. In a one point loss to Broad Run, the Judges lost the game on a foul shot with two seconds left to play. In the final game of the NW tournament, Brian Partlow set a school record hitting six three point shots. In the regional game at Louisa, the Judges' season came to an end with a 56-52 loss. The season record for 1995 was 17-7.

#### **END NOTES 1995-1996**

Handley had a rough year in 1996. Their record was only 4-17, and it was the worst record since 1947 when they went 4-18. They were young and inexperienced, not returning one starter from 1995. And in 1996 bad weather forced the cancellation of many games. In a loss to Warren County by two points, the Judges missed four foul shots in the last 29 seconds that could have won the game. They were also 3 for 11 from the foul line in the last quarter. One bright spot came in this year. The Judges defeated Clarke County on the Eagles' home court. It was the first time in three years that the Eagles had lost on their court. In a game against Liberty, the Judges came from behind with two steals in the last 35 seconds to win 60-57. Head coach Dixon missed this and another

game due to his father's passing. Handley played Sherando in a game that started at 6:30 because of a blizzard warning. In the NW district tournament, the Judges were defeated by Broad Run in Ashburn 67-51.

### **END NOTES 1996-1997**

The Judges had another rough year in 1997, winning only 5 games and losing 16. At the beginning of the season in the Prime Star Inaugural Kickoff Classic, the Judges lost the first game to Clarke County 85-80 in two overtimes. Handley shot a 3 point shot with one second left to send the game into a second overtime. In the consolation game, the Judges hit on 3 of 4 foul shots in the last seconds to beat Sherando. In a loss to Loudoun County, the Judges had only 10 points at halftime. In a loss to James Wood, Michael Crawford of the Colonels scored his 2000<sup>th</sup> point of his career. In another loss to the Colonels, James Wood scored the last seven points of the game to win by six points. In their last game of the season against Warren County, the Judges won with a two foot shot in the last seconds to win 52-50, breaking their 14 game losing streak. In the opener of the NW district tournament, the Judges went to Sherando and lost 93-50, ending their season. Earlier in the year Sherando had beaten the Judges 106-56. The record for 1997, as reported above, was 5-16.

### **END NOTES 1997-1998**

The Judges had a better year in 1998, going 12-9. But they still could not advance past the opening round of the NW district tournament. In the very first game of the year, Strasburg hit a 3 point shot at the buzzer to beat the Judges 51-50. Handley spoiled the opening of a brand new gym in Purcellville, beating Loudoun Valley 66-60. In a win over James Wood, Lang Campbell hit six of seven three point attempts to help the Judges win. Fauquier beat the Judges by sinking 5 of 8 free throw shots at the end of the game. Handley had two great chances of 3 point shots to tie the game at the buzzer, but both clanged off the rim in a 78-75 loss. Handley lost a game to Harrisonburg when the Streaks outscored them 32-17 in the last quarter. In a win over Warren County, the Judges sank 12 of 13 free throws in the last quarter to win 46-40. In the return match with Strasburg, Chad Ritchie hit a desperation 30 foot three point shot at the buzzer to win for the Judges 76-75. Handley won the return match with Fauquier 66-53 to win their 7<sup>th</sup> straight game. Fauquier was ranked number 3 in the state at the time. In a game with Liberty, Chad Ritchie again hit a long 3 point shot to tie the game and send it into overtime. The Judges ended up losing 86-81. Handley finished third in the NW district, but were upset in the first round of the NW district tournament by Warren County 76-72.

### **END NOTES 1998-1999**

The Judges had a great year in 1999. They won the regular season in the NW district, their first district title since 1985. They defeated a tough Strasburg team by hitting on 7 of 8 free throws in the last minute 54-49. In a loss to Sherando, the Judges attempted only four free throws to Sherando's 25. The Judges rallied from a 16 point deficit to defeat Loudoun Valley. Handley lost the return match with number 2 ranked Strasburg 78-63,

which broke a five game winning streak. In a tough game against Fauquier, which went into 2 overtimes, the Judges missed shots that would have won the game in the final seconds of regulation and the first overtime period and lost the game 60-57. Over 1800 fans jammed the Handley gym to see the Judges get even with Sherando 79-71. In the opening round of the NW tournament, Handley defeated Liberty at Handley 68-39, and then lost to Fauquier at Warrenton 50-48, after a final shot to tie rolled off the rim. Handley became the 5<sup>th</sup> straight number 1 seed to fail to win the district tournament. By winning the regular season, the Judges got a regional home game and easily defeated Fort Defiance 77-61. This was Handley's first regional win since 1986. They then traveled to JMU and defeated Western Albemarle 58-57 on a layup with 6 seconds left to play. With this win the Judges were assured of going to the state playoffs, their first trip since 1977. In the regional final at JMU, the Judges faced Loudoun Valley, a team they had beaten twice. The Judges lost the region final 69-66. In the state playoff game, the Judges had to travel to Fredericksburg to face Caroline, and after a bitter battle lost the game 84-77. Their final record for 1999 was 20-6.

### **END NOTES 1999-2000**

Handley had one of the best years in their long history in 2000. They won more games than any other team in Handley history. They won the NW district regular season, but once again they failed to win the tournament championship, losing to Park View in the final 59-56. Actually, they tied with Park View for the regular season title, and had to have a playoff game at Loudoun Valley to determine the winner. The Judges won 72-67 in overtime. Park View had trailed by 5 points with 20 seconds left and rallied to tie the game. Also this year, the Judges Lang Campbell became the 4<sup>th</sup> player in Handley history to score 1000 points for his career. In the regular season, the Judges had many great moments. Adam Dutton scored 40 points in a win over Potomac Falls. They won their first 17 games before losing 62-53 to Broad Run in overtime. They defeated Loudoun County 51-48 after hitting two 3 pointers in the final 3 minutes. A game with Warren County was stopped with three minutes left after the roof at Warren County started leaking. In the regionals, the Judges beat Central at Handley, then defeated Stuarts Draft at JMU, but lost the region final to Waynesboro 68-67 after a Judges' shot at the buzzer to win rolled off the rim. In the state quarter finals, Handley traveled to Stafford High School in Fredericksburg and defeated Caroline 58-45 before over 3000 fans. In the state semi final held at Liberty University, the Judges lost 81-72 to eventual state champion Bruton 81-72. Their final record for the year was a great 24-5.

### **END NOTES 2000-2001**

Handley had another great year in 2001. They again advanced to the state playoffs and won nearly as many games as in 2000. They also were involved in 6 overtime games, one in two overtimes. Against Park View, the Judges made 2 free throws with 40 seconds left to force a second overtime. However, they missed two free throws at the end of the second overtime and lost the game. This year also marked Adam Dutton becoming the 5<sup>th</sup> Handley player in history to crack the 1000 career point total for his career. In a romp over Warren County, the Wildcats had only 8 points at half. In an overtime win over

Sherando, in front of over 1400 fans, Sherando missed their final 8 shots in the overtime period. In another overtime win over Loudoun Valley, the Judges tied the game with a free throw and then won the game in overtime with a 3 point shot with 4 seconds left to play. When the regular season was over, the Judges and Liberty were tied for the NW district regular season title and had to have a playoff game at Stonebridge to determine the winner. The Judges tied the game with a last second layup and then won the title in overtime. In the NW district tournament, after dispatching Warren County at Handley, the Judges faced Potomac Falls at Stonebridge and won this game-again in overtime-68-64. They would have to face Liberty for the tournament title, and in a wild game, lost 63-60. Coach Dixon called a time out late in the game and got a technical because he had no more time outs left. Handley led this game by 11 points with 4 minutes left to play. The Judges played a regional game at Handley and beat Central 56-47, then went to JMU and defeated Robert E. Lee 78-71. They next night at JMU they won Dixon's first regional title by beating Western Albemarle 64-55. In the state quarterfinal game played at James Wood, over 2000 fans turned out and over 100 had to be turned away. The Judges lost the game to Caroline in a hard fought game 64-56. It was the Judges' third straight state appearance. They finished the year with a great 23-5 record.

#### **END NOTES 2001-2002**

Handley had a down year in 2002. In this year three players quit the team, including their leading scorer. In a loss to Strasburg, the Judges blew an 18 point lead. They lost twice to James Wood—the first wins for the Colonels over the Judges in four years. They lost a game to Fauquier by one points on a last second Falcon shot. In a win over Loudoun Valley, the game got rough with two technical's being called and a near fight during the game. The Judges lost the second game to James Wood in overtime, when the Colonels trailed by 8 points in the last quarter and rallied to force overtime. They lost a close game to Liberty in 2 overtimes. The Judges lost to Sherando twice during 2002. The Warriors were ranked as high as second in the state. In the NW district tournament, the Judges had to travel to Liberty for a first round game and lost 66-60. Their record for 2002 was 10-11.

#### **END NOTES 2002-2003**

Handley had a fairly good year in 2003. They won the Loudoun County Holiday Mixer at Loudoun County High School by beating Loudoun County 61-49 and then beating Loudoun Valley with two free throws in the last 13 seconds 56-55. They beat Harrisonburg with an inbound pass at the buzzer 54-52. They defeated Stonebridge by two points when Stonebridge missed a shot at the buzzer. In a contested game with Sherando, the Warriors won on a buzzer shot—the Judges claimed he walked before the shot. They defeated James Wood when they outscored the Colonels 28-5 in the last quarter. The Judges were ranked as high as 9<sup>th</sup> during the year. In the opening game of the NW district tournament, the Judges defeated Warren County at Handley 53-42 before losing to Liberty at Liberty 53-50. The Judges put up a gallant fight in this game, rallying back from a 19 point deficit to almost win the game. Their record for 2003 was 15-9.

## **END NOTES 2003-2004**

The Judges had a great year in 2004, although it ended in an upset in the NW district tournament. The regular season also ended in disappointment, as both the Judges and Fauquier were tied for the title going into the last game of the season. In a game that decided the regular season title, the Judges lost to Fauquier by two points. They missed a game ending shot that would have won the game. In the tournament game with Liberty, a team they had defeated twice, the Judges lost in overtime on a game ending shot with two seconds left to play. Liberty had tied the game on a 3 point shot with seven seconds left. The Judges defeated Warren County during the season at, of all places, Millbrook High School, because the Judges' gym was being repaired. Also this year, Warren County defeated the Judges for the first time in six years. In a game against Millbrook, the Judges won on a last second layup with 12 seconds left to play. James Wood beat the Judges, snapping a nine game winning streak. The Judges should have advanced during the tournament, but were shocked by Liberty in overtime. The season ended with a great 18-5 record.

## **END NOTES 2004-2005**

The Judges had a strange year in 2005. They started out losing their first four games, and then rebounded to win the NW district tournament and get into the regionals. In the regional game, Handley had to travel to undefeated Robert E. Lee and lost 96-64. Handley started out in the NW tournament as the number 4 seed and defeated Fauquier, top seeded Millbrook, and Brentsville to win the tournament title for the first time since 1995. In a three point win over Warren County, a three point shot at the buzzer from the Wildcats was blocked at the buzzer. In a two point loss to Loudoun Valley, the Judges rallied from 14 points in the last quarter and a game winning shot with 6 seconds was blocked. In a three point win over Sherando, the Warriors took a three point shot at the buzzer to tie the game but the shot bounced off the rim. The Judges lost a game to Liberty 64-60 when they had an eight point lead in the last quarter. Their final record for 2005 was 12-10.

## **END NOTES 2005-2006**

The Judges had a great year in 2006. They won the regular season NW district title outright for the first time since 1999. They won the NW district tournament title, beating Sherando, Brentsville, and Millbrook. They defeated Western Albemarle in the regional quarterfinal 72-54-their first regional victory in five years. In the region semi final, they had the misfortune of meeting up with undefeated state champion Robert E. Lee, and put up a good fight for a half, but lost the game 84-76. It was the first time all year that Lee had trailed at half and the victory was Lee's 82 win in a row. The loss also snapped Handley's 14 game winning streak. During the regular season, only a one point loss to Millbrook prevented the Judges from going through the district undefeated. The Judges lost two games to Heritage by a total of 10 points and with the one point loss to Millbrook were the only regular season losses the Judges suffered in 2006. In the one point loss to Millbrook, the Judges should have won in the last seconds, as they were



fouled with 7 seconds left; Chad Moore was fouled on a basket. With a chance to tie, he missed the free throw but the Judges got three more shots to win the game but none would fall. Early in the season the Judges played in the Fellowship of Christian Athletes tourney at James Madison University and defeated Strasburg 66-31. Altogether, the Judges had one of the best years in their long history. The final record for 2006 was 21-4.

### **END NOTES 2006-2007**

Handley had a great year in 2007. They played Millbrook four times this year, winning one game against them in a game played at the Verizon center. After the game, the tickets included a Wizards game played that night. They then lost the return game to Millbrook and also lost a special game with them to determine the winner of the NW district. The playoff game for first place was played at James Wood and seating was limited to the first 1100 fans. The Judges evened the score in the NW tournament, beating Millbrook in the championship game 60-46. One hour after the gates were opened at Millbrook the doors were closed. It was the third straight year the Judges had won the NW tournament. They lost to Potomac Falls in a bitter contest early in the season by two points, but got even with them by defeating them by one point in the regionals. It was the first loss all season for Potomac Falls on their home court. Handley won two games in the Handley/Millbrook Holiday Bash tournament, beating Robert E. Lee and Orange County. In a win over James Wood, the Colonels coach was tossed out of the game. At various times during the year, Handley and Millbrook were ranked in the top five in the state. Over 1500 fans witnessed the second game between the two schools at Millbrook. After beating Potomac Falls in the first game of the regionals, the Judges lost at JMU to Waynesboro 67-62. Their record for 2007 was 22-4.

### **END NOTES 2007-2008**

Handley had another great year in 2008. To start the year out, they split two games with Orange County, then won one game and lost one in the NW/Dulles challenge tournament, beating Potomac Falls and losing to Heritage. They beat Brentsville on a last second layup. They had to play several games at Daniel Morgan Middle School because the roof in the Handley gym leaked when it snowed or rained. In one game with Brentsville at Daniel Morgan, both coaches got technical's and a fan was ejected. In the NW district tournament, the Judges beat Central and Skyline. In the Skyline game JJ Dorsey scored his 1000<sup>th</sup> career point. They had to play Millbrook in the championship game, a team that had beaten them twice during the season. With 30 seconds left to play, Millbrook hit a three pointer that tied the game and sent it into overtime. The Judges lost the game 78-75. They still qualified for the regional's, and traveled to Heritage, a team that had beaten the Judges in the NW/Dulles tourney. The Judges returned the favor, defeating Heritage 62-57 at Heritage. The Judges next had to travel to Charlottesville, and put up a great fight before losing in overtime 74-70. Handley had a chance to win in regulation, but a last second shot fell off the rim. The final record for 2008 was 19-6.

### **END NOTES 2008-2009**

Handley had one of their best seasons in history in 2009. They lost only three regular season games, two to Jefferson West Virginia—one by one point on a three point shot with 6 seconds left to play—and one to Millbrook in overtime. Both regular season games with Millbrook went into overtime. In the first game, a 65-63 overtime Handley win, the Judges trailed by 14 points with four minutes left and tied the game up with 24 seconds left to play. In the second game, a 63-59 Millbrook win, the Pioneers never led until the overtime period. The Judges still had to play several games at Daniel Morgan as the roof on the Handley gym was not fully repaired until near the end of the season. They also played one game against Skyline in the Shenandoah University gym. In their first game in the repaired Handley gym against Central, the scoreboard clock went out. In this year, the Judges won the regular season NW title. In the NW district tournament at Handley, the Judges beat Kettle Run, Central, and in the championship game beat Millbrook to sweep both regular and tournament titles since 2006. In the regionals, Handley got a stiff test in beating Skyline by three points and then traveled to Orange High School to defeat Dominion 60-53. This regional championship was the first for the Judges since 2001 and it marked the first time since 2001 that the Judges entered the state playoffs. In the state game at JMU, the Judges lost a very close game to Greensville County 64-62, in a game they should have won. The final record for 2009 was a great 22-4.

#### **END NOTES 2009-2010**

The Judges had a rough year in 2010. To start with, 37 inches of snow fell during the winter, cancelling several games. The snow and Handley's success in the football playoffs forced them to cancel several games, including the Loudoun Valley Tournament, where the Judges were supposed to start the year playing Heritage and Loudoun Valley. In this year, the Judges played Madison County twice, and lost twice—Madison County went on to win the A state title. The Judges lost a game to Sherando in overtime when the Warriors came back from nine points with less than two minutes to play. In a one point win over Musselman, W. Va., the Judges won on a last second shot. In a loss to Skyline by two points, a three point shot at the buzzer to win missed—it didn't help that the Judges had 33 turnovers in the game. In a return match win over Sherando, two technical fouls were called on the Warriors with three seconds left, and the Judges made them to tie the game. The Judges won this game with 1.8 seconds left on two free throws. In a win over James Wood, the five starters for the Judges were benched to begin the game. They ended up the regular season tied with Sherando for the NW regular season title. In the NW district tournament at James Wood, the Judges lost the first game to the Colonels 71-59. In the regional first round game at Handley, the Judges beat Skyline 70-41 before losing the semifinal game to Western Albemarle at Crozet 58-40. Their final record for 2010 was 9-10.

#### **END NOTES 2010-2011**

Once again in 2011 several games were cancelled because of bad weather. As a result, the Judges played only 18 games. They defeated Martinsburg 65-60—but Martinsburg had several players still out due to football season. They played in the Briar Woods

Holiday Tournament, and faced prep power Middleburg Academy and lost 80-49. Middleburg's first team left at halftime to play in another game. They defeated Millbrook in overtime with the help of seven three point shots. In a game with James Wood, Handley trailed 50-38 in the last quarter and rallied to tie the game up and send it into two overtimes. In the next game with the Colonels, a three point shot tied the game up with two minutes left and the Judges won by one point. James Wood missed a shot that would have won the game with 13 seconds left. In the NW tournament held at Skyline, the Judges lost in the first round to Sherando 63-59—the third time the Pioneers had beaten the Judges this year. Their final record for 2011 was 10-8.

### **END NOTES 2011-2012**

The year 2012 marked the first of three straight years that the Judges entered the state playoffs. 2012 was the first year the Judges went to the state tournament since 2009. After winning their first four games, the Judges lost to Washington West Virginia after leading at halftime by 20 points. They entered the Fluvanna Holiday Bash and beat Spotsylvania 85-39 and host Fluvanna 73-61. Fluvanna was undefeated at the time and these two teams would meet again for the region title. They defeated Woodgrove in the regular season despite a Woodgrove player scoring 43 points. The Judges lost to Jefferson West Virginia after only scoring three points in the entire third quarter. In a game with Sherando, which Sherando could have clinched the NW regular season title; the Judges won 70-60. In their next game, the Judges clinched the regular season title by beating James Wood. In the NW tournament held at Sherando, the Judges squeaked by Skyline 40-39 and then defeated Sherando for the third time clinching the NW tournament title, their first sweep of both titles since 2009. In the regional's, the Judges defeated Woodgrove 65-51, and Monticello 66-62 at Handley before going back to Fluvanna for the region championship. This time Fluvanna snapped the Judges nine game winning streak and won 64-57. In the state quarterfinal, the Judges had to travel to the Siegel Center in Richmond and lost to eventual state champion Brunswick 63-38. Their record for 2012 was 19-6.

### **END NOTES 2012-2013**

Handley had another great year in 2013. They went to the state tournament for the second year in a row. Although Sherando won the NW district regular season, the Judges handed them their first district loss in the next to last game of the year. They hosted the Handley Holiday Tournament at Handley and beat Harrisonburg in the first game before losing a very close game to Spotswood in the championship game 79-76. A three point shot at the buzzer to tie the game rimmed out. They defeated Millbrook with two free throws with 15 seconds left. The Judges lost the return game to Millbrook, marking the 5<sup>th</sup> straight year the two teams have split in the regular season. The Judges won the NW district tournament held at Millbrook for the second straight year, beating Millbrook and James Wood. In the regional's the Judges defeated Fluvanna at Handley 82-69, then had to travel to Western Albemarle for the region semifinal. A three point shot at the buzzer won the game for the Judges 58-55 putting them in the regional championship game against Loudoun Valley at Purcellville. They won their 5<sup>th</sup> region title by beating the

Vikings 58-47-their first region title since 2009. They next traveled to JMU to face Bruton for the state quarterfinal. In a bitterly contested game, the Judges trailed by 11 points with 2.32 minutes left to play and were still down by six points with 54 seconds left in the game. They trailed by two points with 11 seconds left. They stole the inbounds pass under their own basket but a sure lay up to tie the game was missed. The Judges got the rebound and were fouled with .04 seconds left. After missing the first free throw, the second was missed intentionally but Bruton got the ball and the game ended 59-57. A great season ended with a record of 21-5. This would be the last season in the old format of A, AA, and AAA. The next year schools were reclassified as to school population and conference play will be introduced. Handley entered Conference 23, while the rest of the local schools entered Conference 21. Handley and the rest of the local schools were classified as Region 4A. The results of this change were there would be more region games.

### **END NOTES 2013-2014**

Handley had perhaps their greatest season in 2014, and they had a new head coach, as Tommy Dixon had stepped down as head coach. He had coached the Judges since the 1986-1987 season. They made it to the state final game for the first time since 1962. They won the NW district regular season (with the new format for Virginia schools that did not mean much. Even the NW district tournament was not played.) Starting this year, Handley would play in their Conference 23 tournament. They started out their year with a close win over Potomac Falls, and then went to South Lakes High School for their tournament. Stonewall Jackson of Manassas cancelled, so the Judges played only one game against South Lakes and won. Coming home they faced Tuscarora and won easily against the former James Wood head coach. Next they traveled for an overnight tournament at L.C. Bird, where they beat Manchester and the next night beat Stafford. All five of their first games were against 5A teams. They defeated Luray next—but a key player on the Judges team quit. Their next game against Loudoun Valley was their first loss of the season 43-38. The Judges then went to Sherando and in a tight game in overtime won 55-52. After beating Harrisonburg and Skyline easily, they ran into a hot shooting Millbrook team and lost their second game 68-56. That would be their last loss until the state final game. They beat James Wood, Luray again, Sherando again, and then got even with Millbrook 68-46. They closed out the regular season with another win over James Wood. The Judges had several games cancelled because of weather that they did not make up, including two with Briar Woods and two with Hampshire West Virginia. Another game with Loudoun Valley and another one with Harrisonburg were cancelled and not made up. In the Conference 23 Tournament, the Judges beat Harrisonburg (conference 23 semi) and Charlottesville (conference 23 final) at Handley to win the conference tournament. In the Region 4A tournament held at Handley as they were the higher seed) the Judges beat Carroll County in the region quarterfinal (Cam Jackson scores his 1000<sup>th</sup> point), Loudoun County in the region 4A semi final and in the Region 4A championship game beat GW of Danville 66-59. They were NW district, Conference 23, and region 4A north champions. Because of the new format, there were no state quarterfinals. They played Glen Allen at JMU in the state semi final and won easily 64-51. They were the Region 4A North champs and would go to the Siegel Center in

Richmond to play the Region 4A South champs, IC Norcom. Trying for their first ever state basketball title, the Judges led the game by 16 points in the last quarter. Norcom then got desperate and pressed the Judges into turnovers. The result was a very disappointing 59-52 loss, only the second time in their history that the Judges had made it to the state final game. Their final record for 2014 was 21-3.

### **END NOTES 2014-2015**

For the first time in four years, we failed this year to reach the state tournament. We finished 4th in our conference, and won our first conference tournament game over Louisa, but then in the conference semi finals we got beat by conference champ Charlottesville. We finished the season with a 7-17 record, which was a little deceiving, as we were in a lot of those games that we lost. We lost the bulk of our scoring via graduation, and we started a lot of younger players-at time we would have four freshmen on the floor. We played well in some games. We upset Greenbrier East, West Virginia—then the third ranked AAA school in West Virginia. We lost to Bishop Walsh in overtime in Cumberland. We defeated another AAA West Virginia school, Hampshire, in overtime. We managed to split with a good Broadway team. We played a good 5A team, Potomac Falls, twice-losing both but putting up a good fight. We lost twice to a good Briar Woods team—but stayed in the games until the end. We lost twice to both Sherando and Millbrook. We lost twice to Loudoun Valley in close games. Altogether, the future looks bright as our young players got a taste of varsity ball. Hopefully next year we will blend better and advance further.

### **END NOTES 2015-2016**

We did a lot better and improved from last year's 7-17 record. We won twice as many games and finished in the championship game of our new conference, 21A. Twelve of our first 15 games were on the road and that presented a challenge. In the Dominion Tip Off Challenge at Dominion, we lost big time to a much bigger school, Stonewall Jackson of Manassas 79-50, our largest defeat of the year. But in the consolation game we beat Falls Church to finish in third place. We came home to defeat Harrisonburg soundly. We beat Broadway on the road next and then lost a close game at Woodgrove 53-49. We won another close game at Hampshire before coming home and playing our best game of the year in beating John Champe 88-85 in overtime. Another tournament on the road followed and we got swamped by Tuscarora 91-68. In the consolation game we killed Manassas Park 69-19. In our next game at Millbrook, we only went to the foul line four times the whole game and lost 48-45. In our next game at Skyline we won easily 62-46. At home against Broadway, we went 6 for 14 at the foul line and lost a disappointing game 59-58. We next traveled to another bigger school, Potomac Falls, and put up a good fight but we lost by 8 points. In our most important game, at James Wood, we lost again by one point 53-52. In this game we blew a 31-10 lead. This loss eventually caused us to lose the Conference 21A regular season title. We won a tight game at Sherando by three points and then at home we polished off Skyline again. We next won against Millbrook in a thrilling one point win 61-60. We got even with James Wood in our next game and then swept Sherando at home 66-60 to finish the regular season. We ended up second to Woodgrove in the conference. Woodgrove lost to Millbrook in the conference

tournament, but still got an automatic bye for the regionals. We beat Sherando in the conference tournament which set up a winner take all game for the conference tournament championship. We led 48-44 after the third quarter, but we got outscored in the last quarter 19-8, and lost 63-56 ending our season at 14-8.

### **END NOTES 2016-2017**

We won more games this year than any other Handley team in history. We only lost three games all year, by a grand total of 6 points. All three losses were to state tournament teams, and two of them were to the two teams that played in the state final game.

We started off with three straight road games, all wins, over Broadway, Charlottesville, and John Champe. We beat Champe with a last second three pointer. We came home and beat Broadway again, and then lost at home to a good Spotswood team after leading the game 53-44 at the end of three quarters. They outscored us 23-10 in the last quarter, all 10 of our points coming from the foul line. We then went on a winning streak, and would not lose again until the state semi finals. We beat Harrisonburg on the road and Woodgrove at home. Then we got even at Spotswood, beating them 58-50. Next we beat Potomac Falls at home, a 5A team that would also go to states. Over Christmas we played in the Eastern View Holiday Tournament, and beat Brooke Pointe and a good Eastern View team. District play started, and we beat Millbrook, Sherando, James Wood and Skyline twice each, winning the Northwestern District title. In between, we beat Woodgrove again as well as Hampshire West Virginia. We went to the Kings Fork Showcase, spent the night at Virginia Beach, and beat George Wythe (Richmond). Going into the Conference 23 tournament (we won the regular season Conference 23 title) we were 21-1. In the tournament, we beat Harrisonburg and in the title game beat Sherando for the third time. Our first game in regionals at home we beat William Byrd by 10 and then beat GW Danville at home 62-58 to make it to the region final against Loudoun Valley in Purcellville. In a packed and crazy gym, we lost to Valley by one point 63-62. Some very questionable calls cost us this game and because we both had the same record, a coin toss cost us a home game. It was the only game that Valley would win by less than double digits. They eventually won the state 4A title. We entered state play at Roanoke Civic Center, and after easily beating Hanover we spent the night and played Jamestown in the state semi final. Jamestown had lost only two games all year, one to a 5A school. Bethel, who would go to the 5A state final, and to 6A Granby. We trailed the whole game, but with 9 seconds left we had a shot to win. After Jamestown missed two free throws, we took the ball the length of the court and had two shots under the basket to win the game, but both missed-the last shot rolling off the rim as time expired. We lost 66-65 and fell one game short of going to our third state final game. We finished 26-3, a record for wins. With most off our team coming back, next year looks bright.

### **END NOTES 2017-2018**

Another great year. We won our 23<sup>rd</sup> NW district title, our 17<sup>th</sup> NW district tournament title, our 7<sup>th</sup> regional title, and made our 3<sup>rd</sup> state final appearance. We came within .4 seconds from winning our first ever state title.

We won our first eight games. We beat Harrisonburg 71-40, Kettle Run 77-38, Spotswood 78-64, Warren County 72-33, Heritage (NN) 79-62, and Skyline 73-34. We then left right after Christmas for Virginia Beach for the Norfolk Scope Invitational tournament, where we beat Granby 74-61, and Booker T. Washington 65-48. In the championship game we suffered our first loss of the season to Maury 64-59. In this game we played without one of our starters. In our next game we beat Fauquier 68-40. Then we traveled to Millbrook and beat them 75-50. Gus Wise recorded his 1000<sup>th</sup> point in this game. Next we traveled to Loudoun Valley, always a tough place to play, and after a close game we lost our second game of the season 78-68. We won our next two games, over Liberty 69-38, and over Sherando 63-44. We probably played our worst game of the year in our next game at Spotswood, losing our third game 72-67. We wouldn't lose again until the state final in Richmond.

We buried James Wood next 77-24, Kettle Run 69-35, Fauquier 69-52, had a close win against Millbrook 64-61, beat Liberty again 90-58, and closed out the regular season by hammering James Wood again 71-36. The conference format was eliminated this year, and the old NW district tournament was brought back.

As the regular season champs, we got a bye the first round. We played Fauquier again. They had beaten Liberty earlier. We beat them for the third time 86-36. In the championship game we played Millbrook, who had beaten James Wood and Sherando. We beat them for the third time also, 80-56, winning the NW district tournament title.

In region C, the top two teams from the NW district and the Dulles district would face off for the region title. Loudoun Valley, seeded number 1, easily beat Millbrook 89-62 and Handley, seeded number 2 beat Woodgrove 76-67 to set up the region C championship between Handley and Valley in Purcellville. In a classic close game, we won the region C title over Valley 58-51. Both teams qualified for the state tournament. Valley would have to travel while we would be close to home. We both knew we would meet again.

And we did. We beat Jefferson Forest 57-41 before a sold out arena at Shenandoah University. Loudoun Valley went to Lynchburg and soundly defeated EC Glass. We would play Valley again in the state semi final at Shenandoah U.

In another classic, and sellout, both teams gave it all they had. With the game tied in regulation, Valley had a clear shot to win the game, but Gus Wise came from out of nowhere to block the shot and send the game into overtime. In overtime, it was our turn to have the last shot. Michael Brown hit a shot in the lane as time ran out to win the game for Handley 54-52 and send us to Richmond for the state final.

We would play Lake Taylor, the region D champion, who had only lost one game (Maury) all year. Many said they were the best team in all classes in the state of Virginia. We would also be playing them without one of our starters.

We started off slow, and by the half we trailed by ten points, 31-21. We caught up by the end of the third quarter, outscoring them 17-6. The last quarter was wild, as we both exchanged leads. We lead 50-49 with 16 seconds left and had two foul shots, but missed them both. Lake Taylor took the ball down the court and tried several desperation shots. In one of the shots, a foul was called on Handley, but everyone thought the game was over. The referee came to the scoring table and said a Lake Taylor player was fouled with .4 seconds left. He was awarded two shots. He missed the first, but made the second to tie the game and send it into overtime. We both scored only four points in the overtime, and we went to a second overtime. By then both teams were spent, and we got outscored 18-12 in the second overtime to lose the state title 72-66. In both overtimes we made only 4 of 12 free throws, 17 for 31 for the whole game. We actually lost the game by .4 seconds, and poor foul shooting. We finished the year 25-4. Despite the loss, we had one of the best seasons in history!

### **END NOTES 2018- 2019**

We surprised everybody in what was supposed to be a kind of rebuilding year. We lost several starters off of last year's state final team, but kept rolling anyway. We beat Warren County in our first game, in which their coach and one of their players got technical fouls. It was an 82-56 blowout. We had a little trouble at Liberty in our next game, but squeaked out a 62-59 win. We beat a good Spotswood team at home 58-46. We blew out James Wood 73-27 in our next game. In the Handley Holliday Invitational Tournament, we beat Class 6 Tallwood 78-60. We next traveled to Myrtle Beach for the Carolina Forest Panther Classic. We spent the first night in Roanoke Rapids North Carolina and that morning headed to Myrtle Beach. We beat North Myrtle beach in the first game 49-29 and the next morning beat Carvers Bay 49-38 to reach the final four. We fell behind in the first half against Myrtle Beach High School 33-18 (we played two 16 minute halves). We came back in the second half but fell short 52-50 for our first loss of the year. We next went to Fauquier and won 69-40. Spotswood got even with us down at Spotswood, and we played our worst game of the year and lost our second game 56-43. We beat Millbrook at home in a close one 54-47, then blew out Skyline 74-49 in Front Royal. We travel to Lexington for the Rock the Ribbon Roundball Tournament and beat Harrisonburg 51-44. We next beat Sherando in Stephens City 71-48 and James Wood again 64-32. In another close one we beat Kettle Run there 59-48, and beat Millbrook for the second time 53-42. We beat Fauquier again 65-44, Liberty again 65-41, Kettle Run again 67-47 and Sherando again 65-33 to close out the regular season. We won the regular season title with an automatic regional bid. In the NW District tournament, we got a first round bye, and then beat Sherando for the third time 63-38. In the tournament championship, we beat Kettle Run for the third time 75-58. In this game we led 1-0 before the game started on a technical free throw because a Kettle Run player dunked during warm-ups. In the regional semi final against Riverside at Handley, we needed a win to earn a third straight trip to states. We led that game after one quarter 12-7 and at half 24-17. We still led after three quarters 36-30, but they caught us in the last quarter to tie the game at 44 and send it into overtime. We only managed to score three foul shots in overtime and lost the game 50-47. Riverside went on to beat Loudoun Valley and lost to eventual state champion GW Danville in OT. We finished a great year at 21-3.



## **END NOTES 2019-2020**

This year we were hit hard with graduation and fielded a young team with only one senior. But we still managed to win 12 games against stiff competition. We won our first three games easily, against Kettle Run, Liberty, and Warren County. Then in the Handley Showcase tournament, we lost two games to larger schools Tallwood and Huguenot. After beating Skyline easily, we left for Hilton Head South Carolina and played three good teams. We lost 2 of 3. We lost to Santa Fe Florida and to Sagemont School but beat Perry County Kentucky. After coming back, we lost badly to Millbrook and minus a key starter we lost to James Wood. We rebounded in our next game by beating Sherando. We next left for Lexington to play in the Rock the Ribbon tournament and lost to Spotswood by six points. We beat Liberty in our next game, coming from a 20 point deficit to win at the end but followed that with an overtime loss to Millbrook. We won our next four games in a row, beating Culpeper, Kettle Run, Culpeper again and James Wood. But then we lost our next two games, both to Fauquier 48-45 and 64-63 in overtime. We also lost next to Sherando, missing two starters who had missed the team bus, 41-38. We finished the Northwestern District regular season tied with James Wood and Liberty with 8-6 records. With three teams tied, a drawing was held by numbers, and Handley got a second seed, James Wood the third seed, and Liberty the fourth seed. In the tournament, we beat Culpeper easily but in the district semifinal we lost to Kettle Run 47-45, a team we had beaten easily twice in the season, 68-44 and 75-45. We finished the year 12-12 and with most starters returning next season, our outlook looks great.

## **END NOTES 2020-2021**

What a crazy year! COVID caused fall football to be cancelled until spring, and basketball was put off until mid January. We opted to start and follow the VHSL schedule, so we could play in the post season. Our county neighbors opted to start later, locking them out of the VHSL playoffs. So we teamed up with the Fauquier County and Culpeper teams only to play a schedule. For a while it looked like we might not play at all. Along the bumpy road we went 11-1, went to the state final for the 4<sup>th</sup> time in history, and added another 1000 career point scorer, the 10<sup>th</sup>. It was a great ride.

We marched through the regular season 6-0, no one getting any closer to us than 15 points. Our second game with Fauquier was cancelled because of COVID and our second game with Culpeper was cancelled by snow and not made up. In the district tournament we beat Kettle Run for the third time by 12 points and in the tournament championship we beat Culpeper 101-60, the third time in history we scored over 100 points. We won our 25<sup>th</sup> regular season title and our 19<sup>th</sup> NW district tournament title.

In the regional tournament this year, only the regional champion could advance to states. In the region semi we beat Dominion 55-37 at home and in the region final we won our 9<sup>th</sup> region title by beating a very good Loudoun County team at home 55-53. We had to travel a long way to Halifax County to win against another strong Halifax team 52-49 in

overtime. A last second near half court Halifax 3 pointer tied the game in regulation. We were now in our 4rth state title game.

Because of COVID there was no state title game in Richmond, so it was played against Smithfield at Handley. We controlled the first have, at times a double digit lead, but we got outscored 21-8 in the third quarter and struggled to get back. Both teams were undefeated coming in---we gave it our best shot but came up short, losing 61-54 and finishing 11-1. It was a great season, albeit a strange one. Demitri Gardner became the 10<sup>th</sup> player in history to achieve 1000 points in his career. Fans had to watch games on facebook live, NFHSnetwork, or in the case of the state final at the Alamo draft house. Pride.

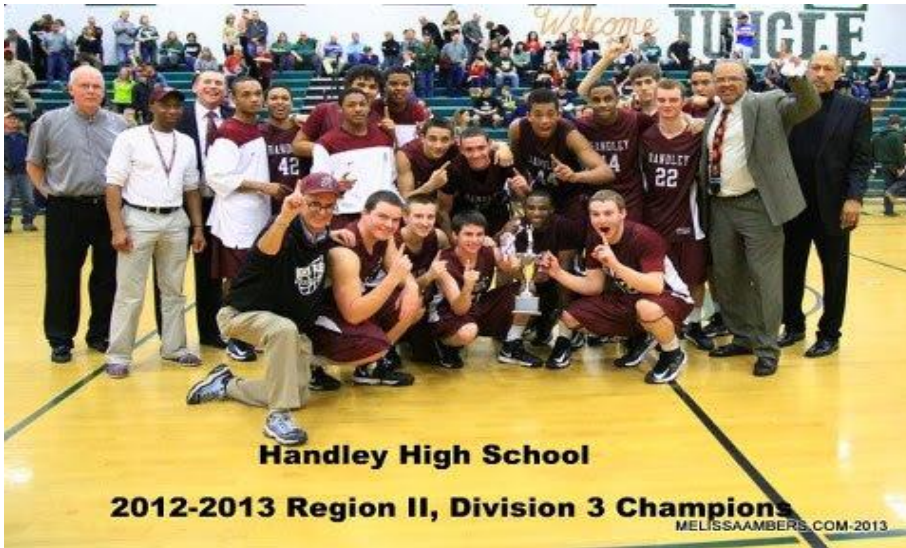
### **END NOTES 2021-2022**

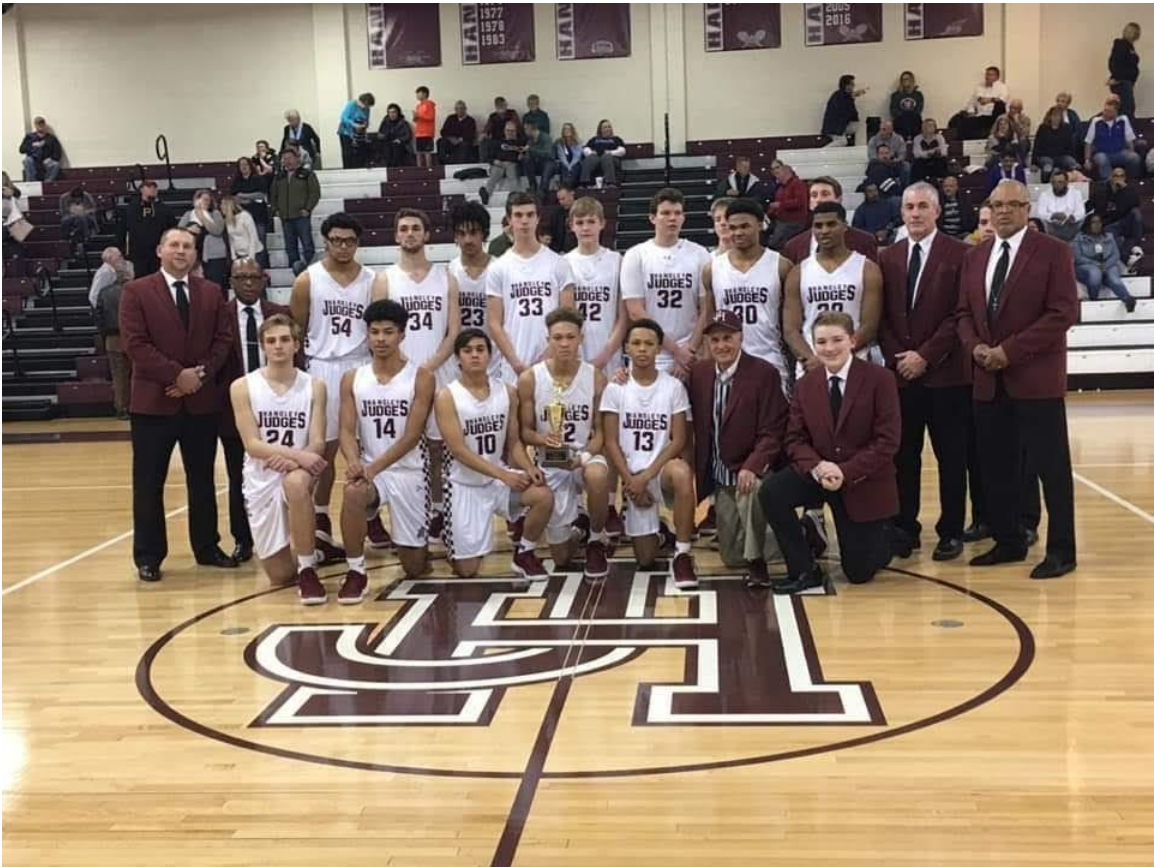

### **END NOTES: 2022-2023**

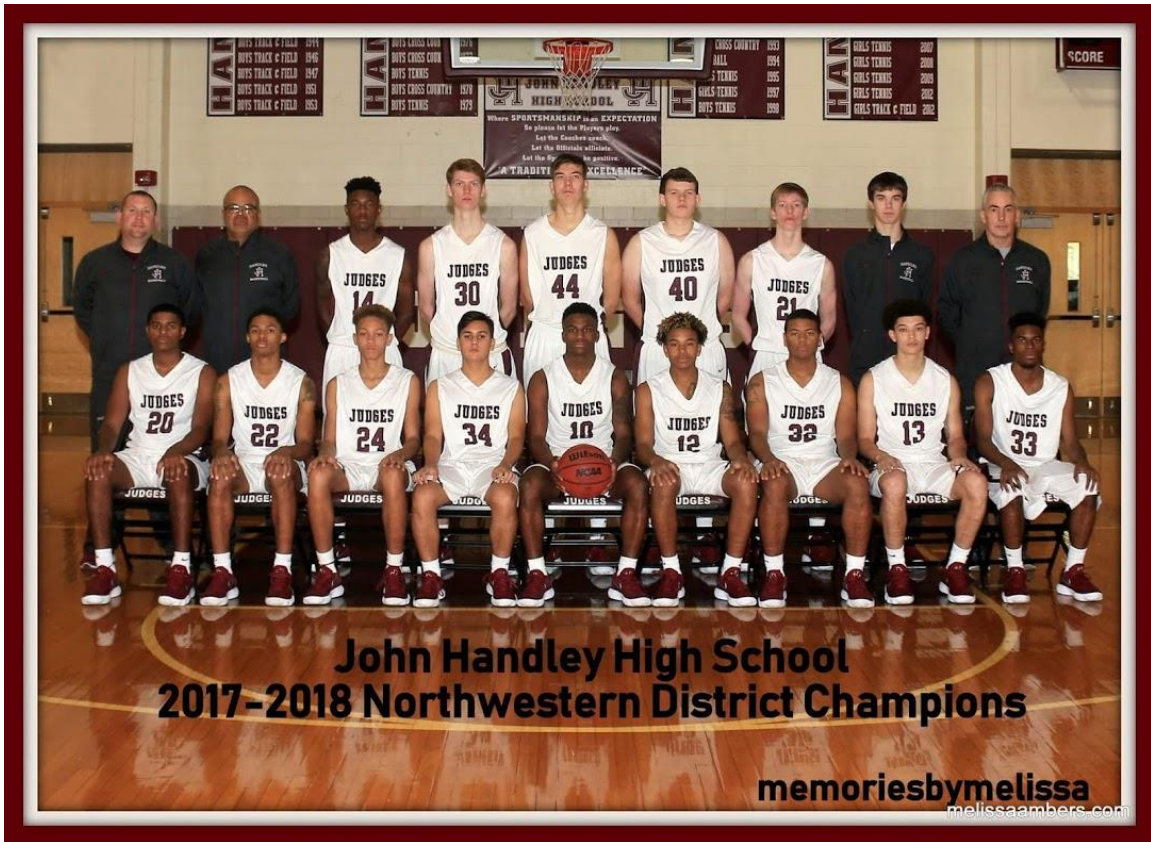
